HAPPY 381ST BIRTHDAY TO THE NATIONAL GUARD







What? 381 years! That's correct, the Army National Guard was born on December 13, 1636, when the Massachusetts Bay Colony organized three militia regiments to defend against the growing threat of the Pequot Indians. Today, the Army National Guard continues its historic mission of providing defense for the nation.

Since 1636, the Guard has been an elite group of warriors who dedicate a portion of their time to serving their nation, and has brought glory and honor upon itself and its soldiers through quiet and selfless service. Each state has its own Guard, as required by the Constitution; in fact, it is the only branch of the military whose existence is required by the Constitution.

The Florida Department of Military Affairs, headquartered at St. Francis Barracks in St. Augustine, FL, is composed of the Florida Army National Guard and Florida Air National Guard. Both branches are administered by the state Adjutant General, an appointee of the Governor of Florida, and fall under the command of the Governor. Guard service members abound in St. Augustine, so if you should encounter any around town, be sure to give them a salute and a Happy Birthday salutation!

Back in August one of our newer members, Patrick Favale, approached our Board of Directors about the possibility of our Chapter integrating our members with the St Johns County school system in some significant and meaningful manner. He, Pat, has been our Classroom Veterans Committee Chairman since then, and has done a magnificent job of making this dream come true.

Another member, Blair Craig, had previous experience with such programs in St Johns County when the Joe Foss Institute was active in this area (the Joe Foss Institute is a nonprofit organization that aims to promote an appreciation among students for the American tradition of liberty, the country's military history,

and patriotic values). Pat and Blair paired up to work with the St Johns County Board of Education and began receiving requests to fulfill certain curriculum requirements.

Our first venture was with Blair Craig and John Leslie spending a day at Sebastian Middle School during "Constitution Week" on 21 September with lessons on the Constitution. Then, on 8 November, Bob Dinkins spent time with 2nd Grade students at the Turning Point Christian Academy, with a very inquisitive audience.

More recently, Pat's efforts resulted in five of our members engaged in four county High Schools on 10 November with lessons on Veterans Day, including its meaning, its differences with Memorial Day and Armed Forces Day, and some suggestions how to recognize Veterans and how to thank a Veteran for his or her service.

In summary, our Veterans in the Classroom for the Veterans Day presentations were Pat Favale (Creekside High School), Blair Craig (Bartram Trail High School), Bob Dinkins (St Augustine High School), and Marshall Persky and Joan Whitfield (Nease High School).

All-in-all, the Veterans in the Classroom team has made presentations at six county schools on three occasions, and have reached nearly 1500 students in so doing. **AWESOME!!!**

VETERANS ONLINE SHOPPING BENEFIT



The military exchanges have ramped up their stock and shoring up their websites' capability as they launched the Veterans Online Shopping Benefit on November 11, opening their online, tax-free stores to millions of new customers. I personally verified the process, and within 10 minutes of verifying my veteran status at www.vetverify.org I was shopping for clothes on the Navy Exchange website (one of several selections) at NAS Jacksonville.

It is estimated that 18 million new shoppers are eligible for the benefit, which was approved by the Defense Department in January. It's available to all honorably discharged veterans of U.S. armed forces; veterans should visit

www.vetverify.org to verify their eligibility before trying to shop. This benefit applies only to online exchange shopping, not to shopping in brick-and-mortar stores, and it doesn't extend to veterans' dependents.

The websites are: www.shopmyexchange.com; www.mynavyexchange.com; & www.shopcgx.com. Any eligible shopper can shop at any of the websites. Actual exchange prices aren't visible until you log in as an authorized shopper, and you don't have to add sales tax.

VVA 1084 ORAL HISTORY PROJECT

I announced at a recent monthly meeting that I was planning to form a committee to begin an Oral History Project for our chapter, and on 21 November we recorded our first such interview in conjunction with the *Community Hospice Veterans Partnership* with me as the subject of the interview. It worked well, but will take some time, at least two weeks or so, to get the interview posted on the Community Hospice Veterans Partnership website (vhpfirstcoast.org), and sent off to the Library of Congress.

My interview was conducted by Donnie Robbins, an employee of the Community Hospice and Palliative Care, here at their St Augustine office on SR-16. Donnie and I met several months back by chance, and then were in the same training class required by Community Hospice to become certified as interviewers for the Veterans History Project. My interview was his, as well as my, first real exposure to this whole process. But now we are ready to work as a team to conduct as many interviews as our time will allow.

The interviews will be video recorded, and normally last around one hour. You will receive a copy of your interview on DVD to share with family and friends. A copy of your interview will also be sent to the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C. to be archived there. And, as mentioned above, the interview will be posted to the Community Hospice Veterans Partnership website at <a href="https://www.whospicul.com/whospic

We want you to share your memories with us! If you wish to be interviewed, or if you are just not sure about it, contact me, John Leslie, at 904-233-4712 or at john_leslie15@yahoo.com and we can get together and discuss the process face-to-face. There is paperwork to submit, which I will provide and assist in its completion. I will also provide you the interviewer's template for questions to be asked – but you can control which questions are out of bounds for whatever reason – no questions asked.

So, if you are interested contact me and I will provide you with the required paperwork and the list of possible questions that could be asked. I wrote down my basic answers in advance to assist me in remembering those details I thought I might need to recall. Then Donnie and I discussed some of those that weren't pertinent to my situation, and that we could pass over if the time was reaching our desired range – we were told that if it was 45 minutes it was too short, and if it exceeded one hour it was probably too long. Mine was 52 minutes duration, but the whole process took approximately four hours due to set up, battery failures, head-breaks, taking photos of memorabilia that I brought with me (part of the deal), and post-interview conversations on our process. Your process should not come close to be that long.

PTSD, SUBSTANCE ABUSE, AND SUICIDE

The following discussion is lifted from the National VVA PTSD & Substance Abuse Committee Report as included in the November/December 2017 issue of *The VVA Veteran* magazine (Vol.37 No.6) authored by Thomas C Hall, Ph.D., (Chairman):

"In the last year VVA chapters, states and regions have sponsored town halls on suicide prevention across the country. Veterans report too many suicides among our brothers and sisters in arms. Veterans over fifty years of age are especially at risk for suicide.

The PTSD/SA Committee acknowledges the difficulty in discussing suicide. Yet we must have that discussion – just talking with a friend or family member who is considering suicide can help stop that person from taking his or her life. The following action steps, taken from the National Institute of Mental Health website, can disrupt someone's attempt at suicide.

ASK: "Are you thinking about killing yourself?" It's not an easy question, but studies show that asking at-risk individuals if they are suicidal does not increase suicides or suicidal thoughts.

Keep Them Safe: Reducing a suicidal person's access to highly lethal items or places is an important part of suicide prevention. While this is not always easy, asking if the at-risk person has a plan and removing or disabling the lethal means can make a difference.

Be There: Listen carefully and learn what the individual is thinking and feeling. Findings suggest acknowledging and talking about suicide may in fact reduce rather than increase suicidal thoughts.

Help Them Connect: Save the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline's number in your phone so it's there when you need it: 800-273-TALK (8255), Veterans, press 1. You can also help make a connection with a trusted individual such as a family member, friend, spiritual advisor, or mental health professional.

Stay Connected: Staying in touch after a crisis or after the at-risk person has been discharged from care can make a difference. Studies have shown that the number of suicide deaths goes down when someone follows up with the at-risk person.

There is much more to talk about suicide prevention. Discuss this at your chapter, state, and regional level. When others realize they are not alone in their experience, the entire community can become healthier and more supportive to veterans and their families."
