



MINUTES OF GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING

FEBRUARY 27, 2025

CALLTO ORDER: Chairman Dudley

WELCOME AND OPENING REMARKS: Chairman Dudley

PLEDGE: Chairman Dudley

INVOCATION: Chaplain Jefferson

INTRODUCTION OF NEW GUESTS: New attendees introduced themselves and who they represent.

MINUTES OF LAST MEETING: Minutes of last meeting conducted January 30, 2025, were presented by Chairman Dudley. Copies of the Minutes are available on the sign-in table and were sent to members electronically by the Secretary. The minutes were approved by voice vote with no changes.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Treasurer Mountcastle presented the January and February's Treasurer's Reports to the Council. The Council's December balance was \$178,581.56. As of January 29, 2025, the Council's total liquid cash balance was \$165,642.41. Treasurer Mountcastle went over the Treasurer's Report including all incoming funds and expenses going out. The floor was open for any questions. The Treasurer's Report was approved by voice vote with no changes.

SPEAKERS:

RICK McALLISTER, VIETNAM TUNNEL RATS

Mr. McAllister presented a slide show presentation on Vietnam Tunnel Rats. Mr. McAllister gave the history of the tunnels of Vietnam as far back as the 1800's. He gave a background on why the tunnel complexes were created and their existence during the Vietnam War. The Tunnel Rats for the US Forces, for the majority, were Combat Engineers. Mr. McAllister spoke of his experience as a Tunnel Rat while serving in Vietnam. He discussed what he went through with his duties of going down in the tunnels and what he encountered.

The floor was open for questions.





VETERANS SERVICE OFFICE, MAC MCDERMOTT

Mr. McDermott spoke of selecting a new Service Officer, a Navy Veteran, and he appears that he is going to fit into the St. Johns County Veterans Service Office very well. The training course for newly hired Service Officers is now offered online and hopefully his certification will happen sooner than in the past. The annual training/re-certification for all Service Officers will take place May 4th — 8th. Mr. McDermott also talked about Jonathon Rios, the latest hired Service Officer who is coming off his 6-month probationary period and is doing very well.

Mr. McDermott also spoke of the Veterans that are having concerns over benefits being taken away, or reduced, with the new Administration in Washington DC. He assured the audience, through the Secretary of the VA, that no benefits are going to be reduced or taken away at this time.

The floor was open for questions.

VETERANS TREATMENT COURT, JOHN LESLIE

Mr. Leslie introduced himself and gave the history of and what the Veterans Treatment Court (VTC) does for our Veterans in the legal system. The VTC is now in its nineth year. There will be two new graduates at the February 28th Treatment Court hearing, everyone is invited to attend. Mr. Leslie gave an update on the VTC and the number of participants the VTC has helped through the legal system process, there are currently 41 Veterans inflow. There are currently fifteen mentors, but the VTC is always looking for additional volunteers to become mentors.

The floor was open for questions regarding the VTC.

UNFINISHED/NEW BUSINESS

Chairman Dudley gave an update on the Veterans Village and things are going well. Some of the contract repairs are beginning. All the Military Service flags are now in place and attached to the building. All permits have been approved for the flag poles and those should be going in soon. There is currently 75% occupancy at Veterans Village and other rooms are being repaired. There are already approved Veterans on a waiting like for those rooms when repairs are complete.

The SR16 facility is coming along very nicely and hopefully by early April there will be a grand opening at the complex.

Chairman Dudley spoke of the current spending of the Veterans Council funds and the quick drawdown of the money. There have been many requests for assistance since before Christmas. Many Veterans need help, and several other organizations are recommending Veterans contact the Veterans Council for assistance. We help as much as we can, but unless more funding becomes available, we may have to limit our assistance also. Chairman Dudley is working with others, such as the AMP, to locally help continue raising the needed funds.

Chairman Dudley spoke of the upcoming 50th Anniversary Remembrance of the ending of the Vietnam War on March 29, 2025. He encourages all to attend the local celebrations that will be held.

Chairman Dudley had the Jacksonville National Cemetery Support Committee down to St. Augustine for a tour of our local National Cemetery. A historical tour was given to them. The purpose of having them come down was to show them the issues we are experiencing with the dire need for repair for several of the areas throughout the St. Augustine National Cemetery. Numerous letters have been written requesting support and hopefully having them visit will help in acquiring support for the repairs needed.

The floor was open for questions and new business.

The meeting adjourned at 8:32 pm.

Periodically we update our "Talking Points" which is a general overview of the National POW -MIA Memorial and Museum project. The latest info can be found on our website, but thought I

would personally share this update with you all who have provided such supportive interest and efforts for this important endeavor. Thank you all, and as always, any comments or specifics you think should be included or updated in our Talking Points, are welcome.

TALKING POINTS FOR NATIONAL POW/MIA MEMORIAL AND MUSEUM

"PROJECT MISSION:

To honor all former Prisoners of War (POW) held during the nation's conflicts from World War II through the present; to remember and never forget those Missing in Action (MIA) heroes remaining unaccounted-for from all branches of the Armed Forces and the families who seek their return.

The establishment of a memorial and museum will give the nation a special place to honor and appreciate the legacy of POWs, MIAs and their families.

PROJECT LOCATION:

The Memorial is located near Jacksonville, Florida, highly accessible as a national destination via the interstate system and in proximity to other military-themed museums in the southeast.

The 26-acre project is located on the grounds of the former Naval Air Station Cecil Field, one of the Navy's most historic Master Jet Bases, which had closed though the BRAC process in 1999.

The acreage surrounds the former Naval Station Chapel. The Chapel, now the "Chapel of the High-Speed Pass," is now completely renovated and has been designated as an historical landmark.

The foundation for the memorial and museum is a small existing memorial that was dedicated in 1973 and honors Jacksonville area aviators missing and captured from the Vietnam era through the first Gulf War.

The concept for the POW-MIA flag was an effort by Mrs. Mary Hoff, a longtime resident of the area and the wife of an unaccounted-for Navy pilot. She was also instrumental in erecting the existing memorial. The flag, adopted in 1972 by the National League of POW/MIA Families, has become an international symbol whose visibility and importance continue to grow.

The Memorial's address is: 6112 POW-MIA Memorial Pkwy, Jacksonville, FL 32221

ORGANIZATION AND PROJECT DEVELOPMENT:

National POW/MIA Memorial and Museum is being developed by a non-profit, 501(c)3 organization and will be self-sustaining. The Board of Directors all work in a volunteer status.

Designed by Prosser, Inc. of Jacksonville, the symbolism within each feature of the project relevant, very specific to other locations in the United States and can be identified by visiting



the website https://www.powmiamemorial.org.

PROGRAM SUPPORT BY:

Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA), the Department of Defense agency responsible for the fullest possi-





ble accounting of America's missing personnel, has visited and supports the project. Plans are to provide displays and info describing the DPAA and the work they do.

National League of POW/MIA Families, Vietnam Veterans Association, Rolling Thunder National, American Legion, National Naval Aviation Museum, Company B, 4th Assault Amphibian Battalion, veterans and other military service organizations as well as present and former military leaders have expressed great support, some formally, through volunteer work, and/or financially.

Returned POWs, their families and MIA families (those still seeking answers and those who know their loved one's fate) attend on-site events and support plans for the project.

Regional/local support from VyStar Credit Union, City of Jackson-ville, Jaguars Foundation, Boeing, Lockheed Martin, Prosser Engineering, LSI, Landstar, Flightstar, Boeing, Rotary District 6970, Jacksonville National Cemetery, and Dobson Electric have generated significant funding and in-kind services.

Ongoing discussions with local, regional and national corporations will result in a much-expanded list as work continues.

Visitation is projected to be 200,000-300,000 people per year.

NATIONAL DESIGNATION:

"National" has been used by some private organizations without legislation, but the leadership of National POW/MIA Memorial and Museum is seeking legislation for proper Congressional authorization that will solidify and augment efforts for the project.

Other national museums, memorials, honorary monuments and sites do not negatively impact a "national" designation for National POW/MIA Memorial and Museum. The vision for the project is to educate and serve the nation for generations to come, often in collaboration and partnership with these relevant entities.

Political leaders in Congress and locally in Jacksonville are supportive of this endeavor, and several have been supportive since the project's inception.

Rep. Arron Bean, U.S. representative for Florida's 4th Congressional district, has introduced a bipartisan House Resolution to grant the Congressionally approved "National" designation.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND ACTIVITIES TO DATE:

Secured 25-year lease from the City of Jacksonville for the acreage

City re-named the 6+ mile long city roadway leading to the site as "POW-MIA Memorial Parkway."

Completed renovation and re-dedication of the former base chapel, where current offices and early museum displays are located

Procured three (3) of four (4) display aircraft and completed restoration of two. These acquisitions and restorations continue with nationwide organizations and businesses

Completed and dedicated a unique Gold Star Families Memorial near

the entrance; it features a bench, flagpole, personalized pavers and plantings.

A temporary museum has been set up in the wing of the Chapel building and is managed by a volunteer museum curator. The future permanent museum section will be constructed within the Memorial facility.

85% funded Phase 1 through regional and local resources named above. Construction is ongoing, with completion of Phase 1 and initiation of Phase 2 in the summer of 2025.

Over 500 memorial pavers have been installed in the Memorial Brick Plaza and at the Gold Star Families Memorial. Bricks continue to be ordered.

The Memorial Brick section will be formally dedicated when Phase 1 site work has been completed, and more will be added throughout the build-out of the project.

March 29, 2025

50th Anniversary Celebration of the End of the Vietnam War



Spoken by Rick McAllister at VFW Post 2391 in St. Augustine during their special "Welcome Home" celebration

In 1998, news anchor Tom Brokaw published a book called "The Greatest Generation". While that term was first heard from a US Army general in 1953, Brokaw wrote that "these men and women fought not for fame or recognition, but because it was the right thing to do." They answered the call of their country and when they came home, everyone in this country celebrated, and rightly so.

These men and women who stand with me today also answered the call of their country. We stepped forward when others stepped backward because we thought it was the right thing to do. We raised our hand to put ourselves in harm's way. We fought on foreign soil, and bled and died just like our fathers and grandfathers did in Europe and in the South Pacific. But when the war was over and we came home, there were no ticker tape parades or hometown celebrations. We were criminalized, assaulted, and worst of all, we were IGNORED.

So, when nobody else wanted to listen to us or help us, we reached out to ourselves. The bond of brotherhood that comforted and protected us in the jungles of Southeast Asia now gives us a moment of peace while those ugly demons of war still rummage through our souls. We were and are the most cohesive and visible of the veteran groups because we had to attend to and mend our own wounds, and then celebrate our own accomplishments.

We may never be called the greatest generation but right now, right here, right this very moment, we want to feel that way. We are ready to be welcomed back home.

March 2025 Support Committee Update On The

Historic St. Augustine National Cemetery

The Iconic Dade Pyramids

Tour Of The Hallowed Grounds

Overview of Some Significant Renovation Projects Slated for Fiscal Year 2025

Ensuring That Gravesites & Grounds Maintained Within National Cemetery Administration Standards

Listed in National Register of Historic Places and Located Upon Approximately 1.4 acres of Sacred Grounds Contiguous to the Facilities of an Active Military Base and Facilities Known as the St. Francis Barracks, The State Headquarters of the Florida National Guard.

Friday 14 March 2025

On Tuesday morning 25 February 2025 under the leadership of Chairman Pat Welch, Vice-Chairwoman Maria Hirsch, Former Chairman Bill Dudley, and St. Augustine Historian Alison Simpson, a large Team of our Support Committee was given an in-depth and very comprehensive tour of this iconic, "non-staffed", historic national cemetery.

Alison is the Command Historian for the Florida National Guard and is responsible for conducting both research of, and leading tours of, the cemetery. Bill is a current Member of our Support Committee and serves as the current Chairman of the Veterans Council of St. Johns County. Bill and his team of local veterans living in the St. Augustine area constantly focus upon supporting both the operations of and conducting many of the high-profile ceremonies held at these hallowed grounds, including, but not limited to both of the following annual

events: Memorial Day in May, and Wreaths-Across-America in December.

This cemetery has approximately 2,800 interments and is operated for the VA National Cemetery Administration by the Jacksonville Cemetery Staff. Except in certain instances, it is currently closed to new interments. The first interment took place in 1828: the first burials were soldiers stationed at St. Francis Barracks and veterans of the Indian Wars. The only interments that are being accepted now are subsequent burials for veterans or eligible family members in an existing gravesite. Periodically, burial space may become available due to a canceled reservation or when a disinterment has been completed. When either of these scenarios occurs, the gravesite is made available to another eligible veteran on a first-come, first-served basis. It should be noted that in March 2025 there will be a burial which conforms with the "exception regulations".

As a follow-up to the February Tour, on March 14th, 2025, Chris Morris, the Director of both the Jacksonville and the St. Augustine National Cemeteries gave Pat Welch and Marie Hirsch of the Support Committee Leadership Team a briefing of some significant renovation and upgrade programs which are currently slated for and underway at the St. Augustine Cemetery regarding: Roads; Dade's Pyramids; the Historic Wall; Main Flagpole; Public Restrooms; the Rostrum Area; and the Lodge.

As shown in the picture, the cemetery is home to the Dade's Monument. The Dade's Monu-

ment is composed of three pyramids constructed of native coquina stone and originally covered with white stucco. The pyramids were dedicated at a ceremony on August 15, 1842, that marked the end of the Florida Indian Wars. The structures cover vaults that contain the remains of soldiers who died during the Florida Indian Wars (1835–1842). According to the inscription



on the monument, the wars began on December 25, 1835. Three days later, Maj. Francis L. Dade and his regiment were enroute from Fort Brooke (Tampa) to Fort King (Ocala) when they were ambushed and killed. Of the 108 men and officers under his command, only two or three survived. Maj. Dade and his men are among those entombed at the pyramids.

Also, the cemetery includes a historic lodge that is leased by the Florida Army National Guard and will concurrently undergo a "historic rehabilitation project" in conjunction with the renovations to this facility already mentioned above.

TAKE A HIKE By Rick McAllister

If you are like most combat veterans, at some point in time and perhaps still, you have been burdened by the ugliness and trauma of war. It is the price we pay for being put in harm's way when serving our country. The VA has made wonderful strides on healing the body or replacing body parts that give you back a part of your life, but they still struggle with solving the mysteries of combat trauma or PTSD. I came home in 1970 from Vietnam with some of it, and while some healing took place with the VA and with private counseling, I'd like to share with you an experience I had that pretty much cleared the way for peace during my remaining years.

In 2012, I had triple bypass open-heart surgery as a result of coronary artery disease from exposure to Agent Orange in Vietnam. I had 95% blockage in the two main arteries and 75% in a third. I was lucky to have caught it in time. During my physical rehab, a friend asked me if I had heard of the Camino de Santiago, a series of ancient pilgrimage routes crisscrossing Spain. I had not, and was told to watch the movie "The Way" with Martin Sheen. I did just that, and then watched it again and again. I was hooked and immediately started the planning process.

Against the concerns of my family and friends, I left on March 31, 2014 for

a 500 mile walk across Northern Spain, starting in the small French village of St. Jean Pied de Port at the base of the Pyrenees Mountains and making my way to the Western side of Spain and the town of Santiago de Compostela. It is here, in a magnificent cathedral, that the remains of the Apostle St. James are said to be interred and hence the reason for hundreds of years of pilgrimages made in his honor. My focus at this time



was more on the physical therapy associated with walking 12 to 15 miles a day in a country that I had never visited. I made this journey on my own

but you quickly learn you are never really alone. People from all over the world make this journey and share the hostels (called albergues), share the pathways, and share the hospitality and spirit of the pilgrimage. Nobody cares what you brought with you; just what you take home in your heart and soul.

The 500 miles makes its way through some spectacular Spanish scenery

and presents you with architectural masterpieces. The Basque Region with historical Roncesvalles and "Hemingwayesque" Pamplona; the Rioja wine region including Burgos and its 300-year old cathedral, and ending as you make your way through the Province of Galicia, finally arriving at Santiago de Compostela. Tucked somewhere in the middle of all this is an area of Spain's Central Plains known as The



Meseta. For many, this somewhat barren, open landscape gets skipped. For others, including myself, it serves up a very unusual spiritual venue.

When I arrived there, my intention was to put my ear pods in and listen to my library of 60's, 70's, and 80's music for the week-long exposure to the non-descript terrain, however, perhaps by divine intervention, I left my pods in the hotel the night before and was somewhat forced to endure what The Meseta had to offer. That first morning, the sounds of the field insects and birds soothed my initial apprehension and soon I was tranquilized by the sound of my footsteps on the gravel farm path and the rhythm of my heart beats. A clarity overwhelmed me and when I walked out of The Meseta seven days later, I had been granted the gift of a very special peace. A peace I had been seeking since I came home from Vietnam in 1970.

Thirty two days after starting my journey in St. Jean Pied de Port, France, I attended the daily Pilgrim's Mass in the Santiago de Compostela Cathedral and the message was clear, "the Camino delivers what the pilgrim

seeks." I hadn't asked for anything other than a fun experience but I was given a priceless gift. Even my family and friends noticed a different person when I got home.

I went back again in 2016 and a third time in 2018, and each time I had not only another wonderful experience but a similar experience on The Meseta. It was for me a chapel without walls and a healing without words.

During the COVID years I thought about making one more journey to the Camino, and then the idea of taking some other veterans with me to see if they would have a similar experience kept popping up. It was worth a try, so for the next year and a half I put together The Last Patrol: A Pilgrimage of Brotherhood and Honor.

I would lead 4 other Vietnam vets on this 500-mile journey. I posted the idea on several Vietnam vet Face Book sites and Camino sites and within a month or so, I had 3 interested in walking the trek, and one who would drive a vehicle to shadow our trip in case someone needed to get off their feet. After all, we were all pushing or in our 80's. We had never met but by the time we departed on September 19, 2023, we felt we had a pretty good understanding of who we were. One was a Huey door-gunner, one was a Birddog pilot, one was a combat medic, and one was a heavy equipment operator. I was with a 101st Airborne Division recon unit.



We started our journey with challenges right out of the gate; lost luggage, misplaced US Passport, and missing hearing aids for someone who could not hear without them. PTSD reared its ugly head on occasion and five old farts with mental and physical flexibility issues took these challenges just like you would

expect a combat veteran to do...deal with it and move on.

When we got to The Meseta, the rains started and pretty much fell the rest

of the way, however, when we walked into Santiago de Compostela, the bond of brotherhood stood strong and tall, and everyone took home some very special experiences. We carried with us a scroll that had the names of over 400 deceased Vietnam vets; some we served with who did not make their Freedom flight home and others given to us by family and friends and even a few from folks we met on the Camino. The scroll was delivered to the alter of St. James in the Cathedral during the Pilgrim's Mass. We had accomplished our mission.

For any combat veteran still looking for a little peace and healing, consider making a pilgrimage on the Spanish Camino de Santiago. You don't have to do all 500 miles but whatever you do, I will assure you it will be unlike any experience you have had. You will walk again in a foreign land with a backpack on your back just like you did fifty-some years ago, but this time you will be massaged the entire way with the spirit of St. James and the brotherhood of a pilgrimage. No enemies, just the hand of friendship and some pretty good wine.

If you don't want to do this on your own or don't have a family member or friend who wants to join you, look into the organization Warriors On The Way. This group makes an annual trip to the Camino and only takes combat veterans. One way or another, take a hike.

Free disabled veteran parking privileges restored at Jacksonville International Airport

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — The Jacksonville International Airport is reverting its recent changes to disabled veteran parking

While people with handicap tags were able to park in the valet and elsewhere for free, disabled veterans whose tags don't have the wheelchair symbol were not.

Airport spokesperson Michael Stewart said the construction of a third garage was making it harder for everyone to find parking. Veterans we spoke with at the time accused the airport of moving them out of the lots to make more money on paying parkers.

Now, those with a regular disabled veteran tag will be able to park for free in the Economy Lots, Daily Garage, and Daily Surface Lot. City Councilman Nick Howland says Hourly Garage privileges will be restored when construction there is complete.

Disabled veterans that have tags with the wheelchair symbol can park anywhere they want for free.

In a post to social media, Howland continued, saying, "Thank you to Chair Michelle Barnett, CEO Mark Vanloh, and the Airport team for honoring our heroes!"

A family treasure unboxed: Goodwill Industries reunites WWII sailor's burial flag with family in Ormond Beach

Over 80 years after her brother's death in WWII, Carol Magill Woodard was reunited with his burial flag during a ceremony at Volusia Memorial Park

Carol Magill Woodard remembers the day the telegram arrived at her family home in 1944.



She was 4 years old. Her mother, clad in her house apron, was ironing and Woodard was sitting on the floor playing with paper dolls. A Western Union employee knocked on the door and delivered the news that her son, 17-year-old William J. Magill had died on Dec. 13, 1944 in the island of Leyte in the Philippines during World War II's Battle of Leyte Gulf.

"She was so upset, she went across to the police department, which was across the street, and she had her apron on, so I knew something was wrong," Woodard recalled. "And then my father was so devastated. After that day on, he went to church every single day before he would go to work."

Over 80 years later, on Monday, Feb. 24, Woodard was reunited with a memory of her half-brother, one that had yet to be unpacked from its original box.

Last November, Gary Hughes, supply chain manager for Goodwill Industries of Central Florida, was going through the contents of a donated tote at the company's Taft hub when he came across a box from the headquarters of the American Graves Registration Service addressed to a Mrs. Lillian M. Allard, Woodard's mom. The box was sent to an address in Pawtucket, Rhode Island, where Magill was from originally from and had enlisted. The family was living in Florida at the time of his death.

It's not unusual for Goodwill to receive American flags in their donations, Hughes said. They normally will contact a nearby American Legion or VFW post to help properly retire the flags. But when he opened the box, he saw that the burial flag inside was still folded, and that the box contained a memorial card with Magill's name and photo. Being a Navy veteran himself, (Magill was a Navy service member), it struck a chord with him, he said.

"I knew we had to do something with it — we couldn't just send it off to be destroyed properly," Hughes said.

He showed the box to Jeff Biles, Territory Loss Prevention and Safety manager for Goodwill Industries of Central Florida. Being a former police officer — and an Army veteran himself — Biles contacted the Pawtucket Police Department to see if he could find Magill's family. An employee at the police depart

ment informed him there was an officer working with them who had the same last name, and said she'd try to help. Two weeks later, she called Biles and informed him that, not only had she found Magill's sister, but that she lived in Ormond Beach.

Biles then spoke with Woodard on the phone and proposed holding a small ceremony to honor her brother at Volusia Memorial Park. The box and its contents, Biles said, was a family treasure.



"I didn't want to just go to Carol and hand her this box," Biles said. "I wanted to make a presentation, because I think that this young soldier deserves that 80 years later."

According to the U.S. Department of Defense, a total of 16,043 soldiers and 7,270 sailors were killed in the Battle of Leyte Gulf, the largest naval engagement of WWII.

Biles has worked for Goodwill Industries for about two and a half years. He said this was the first time he'd gotten the opportunity to do something so special for a local family.

"Even though he's been deceased for over 80 years, still, he's an American hero," Biles said.

Woodard's family has 43 veterans in total. She and Magill were two out of nine siblings in her family. When Biles called her and informed her of the box's contents, she said she was thrilled.

"I couldn't believe it because I had just become friends with a lady that belonged to our church that was from the Philippines, and she's over there now visiting the grave and taking pictures of my brother," Woodard said.

Magill is buried in the Manila American Cemetery.

Woodard said she plans to place her brother's flag alongside other military family memorabilia in her home.

Woodard's father always spoke about how Magill, his stepson, was a good kid. He became his stepfather when Magill was in 10th grade, just a couple years before he enlisted in the Navy.

One of her earliest memories involves Magill and her father — all three of them walking down the street, Magill dressed in uniform. Woodard was 3 years old, and Magill and her father were swinging her together across the street.

"I just wish my dad was here," Woodard said.

The St. Joseph Academy's veteran's reception will take place May 10. Each year students interview veterans and write their stories. Then the stories are compiled into a yearbook-style book. Each year there is a reception where the current group of in-



terviewed veterans are honored and seated around the room so attendees have an opportunity to chat and have their books signed. It will take place May 10 at 2:00 p.m. at St. Joseph Academy at 155 State Road 207 in St. Augustine.

Refreshments are served and all are welcome to attend.

Local veterans who have been interviewed in the past have included Sheriff Hardwick, Chief Michaux, Bill Dudley, Ron Birchall, Bill Coleman, and George Huchting. For the book published this year we have Michael Fleming, John Leslie, Katie Snyder, Ron Mickler, and Joe Shomo.

Here is Clay County Military information about the TAPS Monument in Green Cove Springs. This is the only monument that recognizes the 66 fallen Clay County residents dating back to the Civil War. There are 21 fallen from the Vietnam War.

We will be holding a Vietnam War Veterans Ceremony at the TAPS Monument on Saturday, March 29. It will be 50 years ago that we left Vietnam.

I have included a photo and a story from when the monument was dedicated in 2017.

TAPS Monument Fact Sheet

The TAPS Monument will be dedicated to the 66 Clay County veterans who lost their lives during combat, dating back to the Civil War.

Where: Clay County Historical Triangle, 915 Walnut Street, Green Cove Springs, FL. The new permanent memorial replaces the old monument.

Monument Sculpture: Richard C. Rist, The Large Art Company, Baltimore, MD

Sculpture Details: The four-sided, 5 feet by 5 feet granite monument will have the names of all Clay County Fallen Warriors inscribed. Topping the memorial will be the TAPS sculpture which measures 44 inches tall and a 32-inch base and 23 inches on each side. The high-quality bronze sculpture is finished in a traditional chocolate brown patina was designed by Richard C. Rist, a Navy veteran who owns The Large Art Company of Baltimore, MD.

The sculpture rests on a triangular base which represents a folded American flag. The three rifles — a 1903 Springfield that was used in WWI, a M-1 Garand rifle from World War II and a M-16 rifle to represent the modern era —form a pyramid with the barrels down to symbolize the fall. The stocks of the rifles come together to form the pyramid which is topped by a "steel pot" combat helmet that was used in WWI until Vietnam. A Civil War-era bugle on the base serves to bring the composition together.

Granite: The jet-black granite came from the same quarry as that of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C.

Monument Details: "Remember Our Fallen" will be carved on all four sides of the Monument. The front panel has a dedication from Clay County and a quote from President Abraham Lincoln's famous Bixby Letter. The other two panels list the names from the Civil War through the Global War on Terrorism, The four panel will be left blank for future conflicts.

The monument will sit on a concrete base surrounded by pavers, a major fundraiser by Monument committee and the Vietnam Veterans of America Clay County Chapter 1059. The bricks will have engraved dedications.

Research: Vishi Garig, Archives Specialist, Clay County Office of Tara Green,

Clerk of the Circuit Court. Garig did the historical and genealogical research on each individual and confirmed the names of the Fallen.

Cost: \$82,000. Completely funded by charitable organizations and individuals. Not one governmental dollar was used to fund the memorial.

History: The monument was first proposed 10 years ago by Clay County Commissioner chair Harold Rutledge. In March 2015, the current committee chaired by Gary Newman, President of the Vietnam Veterans of America Clay County Chapter 1059, held its first meeting. The committee has met monthly to date.

"The committee wanted a monument that would stand out for decades to come," Newman said. "It means those veterans that have been forgotten for so long will be remembered."

Vietnam Veterans of America Chapter 1059: Chapter 1059 was chartered by Vietnam Veterans of America in January 2012. Gary Newman is the founder and president. He is also the current president. The chapter has 130 members which participates in various community events — The Clay County Fair, Chamber of Commerce member, Northeast Florida Military Museum, Middleburg Civic Association member and Veterans Treatment Court. Current officers: Gary Newman, president; Harry Silvers, vice president; Paul Haws Jr., treasurer; Darline Teel-Williams, secretary; board members: J.J. Thomas, George McCaffrey, David Treffinger.



How to report a Veteran's death to VA

The passing of a Veteran is a solemn time that deserves to be recognized and reported with the utmost respect. Veterans have served their country and worked hard for their well-deserved benefits.

However, after a Veteran passes away, family members should report the death of the Veteran to VA as soon as possible to stop current benefits payments. If the death is not reported promptly, survivors or executors of the Veteran's estate may have to repay any overpayments received. Payments the deceased Veteran received may include compensation, pension, education or Veteran Readiness & Employment benefits.

VA encourages loved ones of deceased Veterans to follow the guidance below on reporting Veteran deaths to avoid falling victim to benefit scams.

How to report the death of a Veteran

Calling is the fastest way to report a Veteran's death so VA will stop benefit payments, but there are other options available for reporting.

Options for reporting:

By Phone: Call VA 800-827-1000 (TTY: 711) and select 5. Agents are available Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. ET.

In Person: Go to a VA regional office. Find the nearest VA regional office.

By Mail: Department of Veterans Affairs Claims Intake Center, PO Box 4444, Janesville, WI 53547-4444. Include your relationship to the Veteran and any supporting documents that can help us verify the Veteran's identity. Examples of supporting documents are:

Death certificate or other public record of the Veteran's death

Discharge document (like a DD214)

If you report in person at a VA regional office or by mail, provide copies of:

Death certificate or other public record of the Veteran's death.

Discharge document (like a DD214).

Provide as much information about the Veteran as you can when you first report the notice of death to VA. This information will help VA verify the Veteran's identity. This information includes:

Full name.

Social Security Number or VA claim number.

Date of birth.

Date of death.

Branch of service.

Best practices to avoid survivor benefit scams

Save important files, such as the Veteran's military service/treatment records, discharge papers and copies of their VA claims.

Go to the VA website. For guidance on creating an account and obtaining a VA security Personal Identification Number (PIN) to securely access benefit information. A VA Security PIN is an additional way to secure direct deposit accounts from theft and protect Personally Identifiable Information (PII).

Never give out PII via text, and be cautious of suspicious hyperlinks or unfamiliar hyperlinks.

If a survivor is missing a VA benefits payment, identifies a discrepancy in payments, or find suspicious activity with a direct deposit account, contact VA immediately at 800-827-1000.

Review all documents thoroughly. Survivors should never sign a blank form for some

one else to complete later. They should always review the completed form before signing and retain a copy of the completed form for their records.

For protection against identity theft scams, notify the major credit bureaus (Equifax, Experian and TransUnion) to update the individual's credit report with a deceased notice and notify the Veteran's financial institutions so all accounts can be closed or transferred appropriately.

According to AARP, scammers also use names published in obituaries to pretend to be long lost relatives of the deceased. When it's time to write your loved one's obituary, consider leaving out the birthdate, middle name, home address, birthplace and mother's maiden name.

For other scams predators use, visit www.VA.GOV/VSAFE.

VA is committed to delivering world-class care and benefits to Veterans and their dependents by providing survivors with ongoing support and assistance. Check to see if you qualify for survivor benefits, such as health care coverage, Survivors' and Dependents' Education Assistance Program, housing assistance, or even help with burial costs.

For more guidance on how to report the death of a Veteran, submitting necessary documentation and finding additional resources available, visit VA Benefits For Spouses, Dependents, Survivors, And Family Caregivers | Veterans Affairs.

To report a missing VA benefits payment, identify a discrepancy in payments, or find suspicious activity with a direct deposit account, contact VA immediately at 800-827-1000. You may also file a complaint with the Federal Trade Commission if funeral homes charge to set up funeral honors or schedule a burial with VA's National Cemetery Administration by visiting reportfraud.ftc.gov. For other scams predators use, visit va.gov/vsafe.

Burials and Memorials

VA honors the service and sacrifice of Veterans and their family members.

How to Apply

To find out in advance if a Veteran or family member is eligible for burial in a VA national cemetery, click "Apply for Pre-Need Burial Eligibility" to fill out and submit the application.

Apply for Pre-Need Burial Eligibility

If pre-need eligibility has not been determined, upon the death of the Veteran or his or her spouse or dependent (also called the time of need), family members should locate the Veteran's DD-214 or other discharge papers if readily available and click "Schedule a Burial" to begin the process. Then make arrangements with a funeral home, National Cemetery Scheduling Office, or directly with a VA national cemetery.

VA Memorial Benefits

VA takes special care to pay lasting tribute to the memory of Veterans who served and sacrificed and that of their families. VA meticulously maintains 155 VA national cemeteries in 44 states and Puerto Rico and is working to increase access to accommodate Veterans and eligible family members close to home. Currently, more than 94 percent of Veterans have a burial option in an open VA, state or tribal veterans cemetery located within 75 miles of their home.

Note that most if not all of these benefits may be provided for Veterans who are interred in a State, Territorial or Tribal Veterans cemetery. Check with the cemetery to ensure coverage. Some benefits are also available for Veterans who choose burial in a private cemetery.

Veterans with a qualifying discharge are entitled to VA burial benefits. Spouses and dependent children are eligible too, even if they predecease the Veteran.

The following burial benefits may be provided:

Burial in a VA national cemetery

Opening and closing of the grave for burial of casketed or cremated remains, or placement of cremated remains in an above-ground vault, also called a columbarium

A government furnished grave liner

Perpetual care of the gravesite

A headstone or marker with an inscription

A burial flag

A Presidential Memorial Certificate

A dedicated memorial page on the Veterans Legacy Memorial site where friends and family can upload photos and remembrances

Burial in a private cemetery

A government headstone, marker, or medallion

A burial flag

A Presidential Memorial Certificate

Some survivors may also be entitled to VA burial allowances as partial reimbursement for the costs of funerals and burials for eligible Veterans

Please note that gravesites in a VA national cemetery cannot be reserved in advance. To prepare for a private cemetery burial, VA suggests families review these questions and complete required forms in advance.




