# The St. Johns County Board of County Commissioners recognized decorated veteran John L. Patton, who turned 100 on March 23.

Mr. Patton is the recipient of six Bronze Stars from his service in the U.S. Navy during World War II. Aboard the U.S.S. Saratoga and U.S.S. Enterprise, Mr. Patton fought bravely for the United States in the Battle of Midway, the Battle of the Eastern Solomons, and the Battle of the Santa Cruz Islands. After the war, he served as an instructor for the U.S. Navy. In total, he served in the military for more than 20 years (1941-1961). Upon his retirement from the U.S. Navy in 1961, Mr. Patton continued to serve his country in the U.S. federal civil service as an Overhaul and Repair Planner and Estimator until his retirement in April 1978.

Mr. Patton arrived at the St. Johns County Administration Building in a WWII Jeep driven by retired Army Col. Alfred Pantano.

On behalf of the residents of St. Johns County, we thank veteran John L. Patton for his service and congratulate Mr. Patton on celebrating 100 years of life!

# MINUTES OF GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING

MARCH 30, 2023

INTRODUCTION OF SPEAKERS/GUESTS: Chairman Dudley

There were several new attendees at this month's meeting that introduced themselves.

MINUTES OF LAST MEETING: Minutes of last meeting conducted February 23, 2023, were presented by Chairman Dudley. Copies of Minutes and Agenda are available on the sign-in table and were sent to members electronically by the Secretary. The minutes were approved by voice vote with no changes.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Treasurer John Mountcastle provided a detailed report that as of February 22, 2023, there was a balance of \$148,926.99 and as of date of meeting there is balance of \$156,439.53. Treasure Mountcastle explained that the Council keeps about \$10,000 in the Ameris Bank account due to the current banking situation and the remainder in a money market through Fidelity Management in Boston. The fund the Council is in has an average maturity of 8 days, then paid off and reinvested in another week. Currently, the account is earning about 4.2%. Treasurer Mountcastle went over and explained the remainder of the report. The Treasurer's Report was approved by voice vote with no changes.

**SPEAKERS:** 

COL USA (Ret) Jeanette McMahon

Colonel McMahon gave a presentation on the organization Children of Fallen Patriots. She has been working for them for over a year but has been associated with them for over a decade because they provided scholarships for her children. Children of Fallen Patriots help those children that have lost a parent in the line of duty. The organization started over 20 years ago and helps the children of all the military branches. Their mission is to provide those children with a college education debt free. Studies show that about 25,000 kids in our country qualify for these benefits. Each year the organization puts 1,000 students through school. The organization fills the gap of about \$25,000 for the students that are not provided by VA benefits they are entitled to. Colonel McMahon shared the touching story of her and her husband that she lost in an airplane crash and how the Children of Fallen Patriots help her three sons through college after they lost their father. The floor was opened to questions and answers from Colonel McMahon about the Children of Fallen Patriots organization.

# ROBERT COVERT, VETERANS ORAL HISTORY PROJECT

Mr. Covert introduced himself, he is Special Collections Manager at the Research Library with the St. Augustine Historical Society, he was with us to talk about the Oral History Project that was started this year called Stories of Service. Stories of Service is an oral history project focused on collecting, documenting, and preserving the stories of our local Veterans here in St. Johns County. The goal is to collect audio interviews with the Veterans, gather them and create an exhibit and archive space within their collections. Mr. Covert discussed how the interviews are conducted. Along with the interviews, they also collect any documents or photos that the Veteran would like to share. The stories of our local Veterans need to be told and house the "modern" history within the St. Augustine Historical Society. The floor was open to questions and answers regarding the Veterans Oral History Project.

# DONNA BOYCE, ST. JOSEPHS ACADEMY

Mrs. Boyce and her student spoke about interviewing Mr. Ed Trester for their upcoming publication about Veterans and their military stories. Everyone is in-

vited to attend their ceremony of April 30th at St. Josephs Academy. The floor was open to questions and answers. If anyone wants a copy of the book, just email Donna Boyce.

## **COMMITTEE REPORTS:**

# VETERANS SERVICE OFFICE UPDATE, JOSEPH MCDERMOTT

Mr. McDermott discussed the PAC Act and the confusion the Veterans are having with it. He discussed the different claims that can be filed under the PAC Act. Talked of appeals on the past denials. St. Johns County Veterans population is one of the fastest growing in the state. The Veterans Service Office is averaging about 80 new Veterans a month. The wait for filing new claims is now about 4-5 months before decisions are made. The floor was open to questions.

# VETERANS TREATMENT COURT, JOHN LESLIE

Mr. Leslie introduced himself, he is the mentor coordinator for the Veterans Treatment Court here in St. Johns and Putnam Counties and how the Court operates. The Veterans Treatment Court has brought 122 Veterans into the program in the last 6 years and 3 months. There have been 71 graduates and there are 34 currently in-flow. Court is held every 2 weeks and the next Court will be held on March 31st beginning at 10:00am in Room 355 – including graduation. All are invited to attend and observe. There is a core of 14 mentors in the Treatment Court and a need for more. There is also a need for those that are already in the Court for treatment for community service hours and opportunities are needed to help the participants serve their 50 required hours.

Floor was then opened for questions and comments regarding the Veterans Treatment Court.

# **OLD/NEW BUSINESS:**

Chairman Dudley asked to bring a few things to the Council's attention. First, on Tuesday morning, April 4th, at 8:00 am, at the County Commission meeting we are going to celebrate the 100th Birthday of Navy Chief Petty Officer (Ret) John Patton. He will be brought to the County Administration Building in a WWII Jeep. Invitation is extended to everyone to come and celebrate Chief Patton's 100th Birthday.

Second, the Memorial Day Service has been planned out and the speaker for that event will be Brigadier General Shawn Boyett from the National Guard. The invitation was extended for all to attend.

Lastly, this is the 50th Anniversary of the end of the Vietnam War and there will be many, many celebrations to honor all that served in the Vietnam War and to be recognized now as they should have been all those years ago when returning from war.

The floor was open to anyone wanting to make a statement to the Council.

Next Veterans Council meeting will be held on Thursday, April 27th beginning at 7:00pm.

The meeting adjourned at 8:25 pm.

# Vet says it's not too late to respect our Vietnam soldiers | Voices of Bravery, Vietnam

Tony D'Aleo talks openly about the gruesome tactics the enemy used in Vietnam. He believes people need a better understanding of what Vietnam vets endured.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — Tony D'Aleo says he served proudly in the United States Marines.

He believes it's not too late to show more respect to our Vietnam vets, 61,000 of whom still live in the North Florida and SE Georgia area.

He is open about his combat experience.

Most painful are the experiences of losing a buddy in battle. "I had to hold his intestines in. He got blown up," D'Aleo recalls.

"I was trying to wrap him in a poncho to keep his intestines in his body," he says.

And the memory, has it faded?

No. Now, some 50 years later, he says, "I wake up with sweats. Cold sweats."

Agent Orange, battles with the Veterans Administration, and frustration over recognition for veterans' issues all plague D'Aleo.

But he still cannot forget the evil tactics of the enemy in Vietnam.

He says the American soldiers' bodies "would be mutilated." He says because 'you never leave an American behind," he and his fellow marines would come back to the battle site.

But there they might find their fellow marine butchered, his private part "put in his mouth," and his body wired to a tree, he says.

The tactic was evil and tricky. "We would find it and that was to get our minds crazy...'cause that would be the guy in our squad or our platoon. They used that to make us run" right into an ambush in a mad rush of revenge," he says.

He says some of their leaders figured out the strategy of the Vietcong and put a stop to the possibility of more fatalities.

He says, "I wish I didn't go to Vietnam." But he says, kids ask him why he went. His answer is this. "I went to help a country that was overrun."

But even all the trauma, D'Aleo continues to work in the community to garner more respect for veterans. D'Aleo was chosen for the Florida Veterans Hall of Fame. He's frequently at veterans' gatherings, such as the Semper Fidelis Society, to encourage his fellow vets.







# The USS Orleck

On March 25th, First Coast News, the USS Orleck, the Gary Sinise Foundation, and Mission BBQ held a Welcome Home event for the areas Vietnam Veterans. The event kicked off with comments from Captain Daniel Bean USN (Ret.) and president of the Jacksonville Naval Museum welcoming the veterans. Colors were then presented with Casey Robinson singing the national Anthem. The Invocation was given by Rev. Patrick Archuleta, Chaplain for the Cecil Field POW/MIA Memorial. Master Chief Mack Ellis presented "Gratitude for the Veterans of Vietnam". Taps was played by Roger McCall from the American Legion Post 137 Color Guard and a moment of silence was observed for the Vietnam Veterans who are no longer with us. Jeannie Blaylock and Lew Turner from First Coast News welcomed the veterans to the ship.

At that point, from the quarterdeck 6 bells were struck and Captain Bean announced "Vietnam Veterans Arriving, Welcome Home" The veterans then walked thru a flag line provided by the Florida 5th District American Legion Riders. As the veterans walked up the gangway, many had tears in their eyes. At the top of the gangway, Captain Robert Whitkop USN (Ret) saluted each veteran and welcomed them aboard.

The veterans were also given a challenge coin by Jeannie Blaylock and Lew Turner. After the event, the veterans and their families were treated to BBQ by Mission BBQ. The food was all donated by the Gary Sinise Foundation.
















# From The Florida National Guard

We are proud to announce the opening of the 2023 Purple Heart Scholarship Program! This program gives the Military Order of the Purple Heart the ability to assist Purple Heart recipients and their families with their goals of continued education. If you or a qualifying family member want to apply, please submit quickly.

The Purple Heart Scholarship Program is a very competitive program that awards scholarships to Purple Heart recipients and their spouses, children, and grandchildren each year. At least one applicant with military service will also be awarded a Navy SEAL LT Michael P. Murphy Memorial Scholarship Award.

# Scholarship Deadline: July 15, 2023, At 5:00 PM EST

The Purple Heart Scholarship Committee will evaluate all timely received applications and meet the eligibility and application requirements described below. All aspects of the application (academic achievement, extracurricular activities, community, and military service, work experience, letters of recommendation, and essay) are considered and evaluated by the Purple Heart Scholarship Committee. The Purple Heart Scholarship Committee shall make all decisions regarding the eligibility for a Scholarship and a Scholarship award. All decisions by the Purple Heart Scholarship Committee are final.

Not every applicant will receive a scholarship. This is not a full-tuition scholarship. The scholarship amount may vary each year, subject to funding levels. Both the student and the school must endorse Purple Heart Scholarship checks. Therefore, the college or university may exercise some control over how the funds are utilized, which can impact the level of financial benefit realized by the student.

# **ELIGIBILITY**

To be eligible to apply for a Purple Heart Scholarship, applicants need to be a member of one of the following categories:

A Purple Heart recipient who is a Member of the MOPH, or

The spouse of a Purple Heart recipient who is a member of MOPH, or

The direct lineal descendent (child, step-child, adopted child, grandchild, step-grandchild, or great-grandchild) of a Purple Heart recipient who is a Member of MOPH, or

The spouse, widow/widower, or direct lineal descendent as defined above of a service member killed-in-action or who died of wounds. If the Purple Heart recipient is listed as killed-in-action or died of wounds, supporting documentation and evidence must be included with the application.

A Purple Heart recipient who is not a member of the MOPH can become a member by applying online through the MOPH website: www.purpleheart.org. To be eligible to apply for the scholarship, the Purple Heart recipient must be a current member, a member at the time of his or her death, or documented as killed-in-action or has having died of wounds.

A MOPH Associate membership or membership in the MOPH Auxiliary does not by itself convey scholarship eligibility. It is highly recommended that non-Purple Heart recipients become either Associate members or members of the Auxiliary, and such membership does convey additional credit in the application process.

To be eligible to receive a Purple Heart MOPH Scholarship, applicants must meet the following three requirements:

A graduate or upcoming graduate (current senior) of a high school or GED program, and Accepted by or enrolled as a FULL-TIME undergraduate student at an accredited U.S. college, university, or trade school at the time the scholarship is awarded, and

Able to demonstrate the capacity for advanced academic achievement or technical proficiency by maintaining at least a 2.75 cumulative Grade Point Average (GPA) based on an unweighted 4.0 grading system.

# ATTENTION VETERANS, FAMILY MEMBERS, AND CAREGIVERS

"Preparing for death doesn't have to be a difficult process. However, it's a part of living. Being proactive and taking the right steps won't only give you peace of mind at the time of your passing it will ease the minds of your loved ones, especially your spouse. As mentioned, it's never too early to prepare and assemble important end-of-life documents. Advance-care planning lets loved ones and healthcare providers know your wishes regarding medical care if at any point you're unable to express your wants.

Without these documents, families of loved ones often experience much anxiety and stress in attempting to make decisions, causing an already difficult time even more difficult.

Putting your affairs in order may not be a priority, but it should be. Having a Legacy Binder, containing these documents stored in one place and within easy reach of your spouse and family members – will help ease the pain.

The first step to receiving assistance and benefits for a veteran's death is to report it to the appropriate agencies. Social Security can be notified by calling 1-800-772-1213. The Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS) can be notified by calling 1-800-538-9552.

USE VA-FORM 21-686C TO DOCUMENT YOU AND YOUR SPOUSE'S MARITAL HISTORIES.



# Southeastern Guide Dogs offer free dogs to Gold Star families

PALMETTO, Fla. (WFTS) — Emily Hoey never imagined she would become a Gold Star spouse.

Hoey's husband, John, was killed while serving in Afghanistan almost 14 years ago. Their daughter, Isabella, was only a year old.



"It's definitely been a journey losing John. So when Isabella was so young, you know she didn't have any memories of her own. I feel really fortunate that I was able to capture a lot of special moments between John and Isabella with my camera, and I think it's through those pictures that I've been able to create sort of the memories for Isabella, because it's those pictures that you tell stories," she said.

A pivotal part of handling their grief comes from community support.

"I'm still so warmed at the heart, and you know I get goosebumps even just now talking about it because it's when we stop saying their names and helping one another that then their memory has been forgotten," she said.

While her husband, John, is irreplaceable, the newest family member, Elle, is filling a void.

"We couldn't be happier to have been given the beautiful Elle. She's such a soulful dog, and she just makes our family feel complete again."

While Southeastern Guide Dogs primarily focuses on seeing eye dogs and service dogs, they also provide free dogs to Gold Star families. It's a lesser-known program for the organization, but one that's filling a critical need, they say.

Hoey said the companionship Elle gives them, even on the toughest days, is the greatest gift.

"It's truly heartfelt, and I feel so much gratitude for them, taking the time and creating this program to help other families and other gold stars that are also, you know, feeling their loss every day," she said.

# The Long Blue Line: Myrtle Hazard—first woman in the United States Coast Guard

Myrtle Hazard was ready to operate a telegraph the day she mistakenly walked into Coast Guard Headquarters. Not only was she prepared, but she was determined, a trait she exhibited throughout her life.

She was born in 1896 in Baltimore. As a child, she suffered from polio and one of her legs was smaller than the other. Myrtle willed herself to walk without braces. By age 26, Myrtle was married and living in Baltimore together with her husband, their three-year-old son, and her parents.

Just as she was determined to walk without braces, Myrtle was determined to qualify for specialized war work. During September and early October 1917, the Y.M.C.A.'s Wireless and Commercial Telegraphy School ran classified ads in the Baltimore Sun.

The ad promised "Good Salaries" and "Operators in Great Demand." She enrolled in the night class and earned a commercial license three months later.

# From the Treasurer

This year, there are many changes to laws, only a few of which are more advantageous to the Veteran than in prior years.

# **Vote-By-Mail**

One of the little-known requirements is that Florida Voters' Vote-By-Mail requests expire at the end of the calendar year in which there is a general election which was a recent change in the law. In 2022, there was a general election, voting for Federal and State elected officials (remember those annoying ads?), so all requests from the 2022 elections have now expired.

If you prefer to Vote-By-Mail, now would be a good time to request mail ballots be sent to your St. Johns County residence, another address, or, if deployed, request an Overseas or Military Ballot, by going to https://www.votesjc.gov/vote-by-mail. Your Vote-By-Mail request will be valid for all local and state elections, and for the federal (general) elections in 2024.

You may choose an "All Elections Request" (valid through 2024) or request a mail ballot for a specific Individual Election (though I believe it makes life easier to submit an "All Elections Request"). If you have questions, or need assistance, please reach out to the Elections Office at (904) 823-2238.

# **Exempt Organization 2023 Filing Deadlines and Reminders**

**January 31, 2023**: Provide 1099-MISC and 1099-NEC to recipients, and file 1099-NEC with the IRS with 1096

February 28, 2023: File IRS copies of 1099-MISC together with 1096

May 1, 2023: File Florida Secretary of State Annual Report

May 15. 2023 (for calendar-year exempt organizations): File Form 990 family (990, 990-EZ or 990-N) electronically (this is the second year that only electronic filings are accepted). For exempt organizations with other fiscal years, due date is the fifteenth of the fifth month after the fiscal year -end.

Various dates (for charities, not Veterans' organizations recognized under §IRS 501(c)(19)), renew registration under the Florida Solicitation of Contributions Act with the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Affairs. To check your renewal date, go to <u>Florida Charity Check</u>.

# Personal Federal Income Tax Deadline

The IRS's Free File program, available only at IRS.gov, allows taxpayers who made \$73,000 or less in 2022 to file their taxes electronically for free using brand-name software provided by commercial tax filing companies. Free File Fillable forms, a part of this effort, is available to any income level and provides free electronic forms that people fill out and file themselves also at no cost.

**Tuesday, April 18, 2023,** for most taxpayers, instead of April 15, because of the weekend and the District of Columbia's Emancipation Day holiday, which falls on Monday, April 17. The IRS will commence accepting 2022 individual federal income tax returns on January 23.



## **VA SURVIVOR BENEFITS & THE PACT ACT**

ESGR4U

You may be eligible for VA benefits and services after your loved one has passed.



## The PACT Act makes it easier for many survivors to receive Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC).

VA will be contacting survivors who were previously denied DIC benefits and may be newly eligible under the PACT Act. You do not need to wait for VA to contact you to submit a claim.

#### How to Apply for DIC and/or Accrued Benefits

Surviving family members may apply for these benefits using the appropriate VA form on va.gov/family-member-benefits.



#### Dependency and Indemnity Compensation

Monthly payment for the eligible surviving spouse, dependent children or parent(s) of the Veteran or service member IF Veteran or service member died in the line of duty or due to a service-related injury or illness.



#### **Accrued Benefits**

A one-time payment to a surviving spouse, dependent child(ren) or dependent parent(s) of a deceased Veteran based on relationship when the record shows additional benefits (such as VA compensation or pension) due to the Veteran prior to passing.

#### Additional Survivor Benefits Available:



#### **Burials and Burial Allowance**

Burial benefits available include a gravesite in any of our National cemeteries with available space, opening and closing of the grave, perpetual care, a government headstone, marker, or medallion, a burial flag, and a Presidential Memorial Certificate, at no cost. Some survivors may also be eligible for a plot allowance, transportation allowance, and burial allowances based on the service connected disability status of the deceased Veteran.



#### **Final Monthly Payment**

If a Veteran who is receiving VA compensation or pension benefits passes away, their last month of benefits can be paid to their surviving spouse.



#### **Home Loan Guaranty**

Certificate of Eligibility is available for surviving spouses receiving DIC.



#### **Education and Training**

Chapter 35 benefits and Fry Scholarship are the two main GI Bill programs offering educational assistance to survivors and dependents of Veterans who died in the line of duty or as a result of service-related disabilities.





### Are You eligible to file for benefits based on Presumptive Exposure?

Were you exposed to hazardous materials while serving in the military, such as from Agent Orange or burn pits? Did you serve in Vietnam, Thailand or Southwest Asia? If so, you may be eligible to file for service-connected benefits based on presumptive exposure.

Over the course of the last six months, VA has begun processing service-connected disability claims for six new presumptive conditions related to exposure to hazardous materials.

In May 2021, VA started implementing provisions of the William M. Thornberry National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2021 (NDAA), adding bladder cancer, hypothyroidism and Parkinsonism to the list of medical conditions presumptively associated with exposure to Agent Orange. A few months later, VA added asthma, rhinitis and sinusitis (to include rhinosinusitis) on a presumptive basis based on particulate matter exposures during military service in Southwest Asia and certain other areas.

Any Veteran who was previously denied service-connection for any of these six conditions but had symptoms manifest within 10 years of military service would need to file another claim. Be sure to use VA Form 20-0995, "Decision Review Request: Supplemental Claim" when filing. The claim form should include the name of the medical condition and also specify that the medical condition is being claimed due to in-service exposure to environmental hazards.

VA is committed to assisting Veterans who may have been exposed to hazardous materials during their military service.

Be sure to stay plugged in to www.va.gov for the most recent developments around environmental hazards; VA is constantly conducting research and surveillance, as well as reviewing scientific literature for conditions that may be related to exposure during military service.

If you feel you have a chronic condition attributed to an in-service exposure, we highly encourage you

to file a claim. For more information about VA benefits and eligibility, or how to file a claim, Veterans and survivors can visit VA's website at www.va.gov or call toll-free at 1-800-827-1000.




