November 11 is nearing and we will soon celebrate another day of honoring our veterans who have served this great nation. Our program this year will not only honor all veterans who have served, but will honor specifically those who have served during the period of Oct. 2001 -Aug. 2021. This period is recorded as the Global War on Terrorism, the longest continuous engagement our country has ever been at war against our enemy. We have a wonderful program queued up with Maj. Gen John Haas, Asst. Adjutant General for the FLARNG as our keynote speaker and the St. Augustine High School Chamber Singers providing the music

with their medley of patriotic songs. We also have over 40 displays of local organizations that support veterans along with the Vietnam Traveling Wall and the Global War on Terrorism Wall. Please plan to join us and bring your family and friends. The Veterans Council has been heavily engaged over the past several months in fighting veteran homeliness in St. Johns County. This problem has grown to nearly crisis level brought on by our current economic inflation and the lack of affordable housing in St. Johns County. What is the Veterans Council doing to help these veterans that are experiencing this trauma? We are housing many of the veterans in local motels and providing food from our food pantry or furnishing the veteran with a gift card to buy food. We have also

provided many veterans with a gas gift card to help with the purchase of gas in order to make it to their job site.

The Veterans Council is working with several local agencies including the VA and other agencies to find suitable housing for these veterans but the problem has no easy solution, especially in St. Johns County with our massive development of high end housing being built. We will continue to support the needs of the homeless until a more suitable solution is found.

This year we especially recognize all those who donned the uniform during the "Global War On Terrorism." The shock and anger arising in millions of Americans in the aftermath of the 9/11 twin tower strikes were reminiscent of those after the Pearl Harbor attack, sixty years earlier. In both cases, a vicious war of global dimensions followed. Notably, as in all previous generations, millions of Americans left their homes to rally round the flag and shield their country from the further

danger sure to follow. The 20th century WWII ended relatively quickly. The 21st century war on terrorism stretched over two decades, yet we note with special pride that the millions of American women and men who participated in it were all volunteers, including hundreds of thousands from Florida. Here, the 53rd Infantry Brigade Combat Team has just completed training at Ft. Hood Texas in early 2010 before deploying 7,000 miles east for combat duty in Iraq.



Chairman Bill Dudley of the Veterans Council of St. Johns County has announced the annual drive for Wreaths Across America has begun.



From the Adjutant General

Heroes

The past week has been a challenging one for all of us. The lives of thousands of Floridians – family, friends and neighbors – living along our state's southwest coast have been changed forever.

Since Hurricane Ian made landfall last Wednesday, the Florida National Guard has been on the front lines of the state's response. Alongside our brothers and sisters in arms from Louisiana National Guard, Washington National Guard, Mississippi National Guard, Montana National Guard, New York Army National Guard, Georgia National Guard and Tennessee National Guard, the Florida National Guard has mounted an unparalleled response to this natural disaster.

More than 5,000 of you responded to our state's call to duty and we surged operations across 22 counties at the start of this response. We are responding as we always do, and are performing our "normal" tasks, such as search and rescue, law enforcement augmentation, and commodity distribution at our usual level of excellence. However, we also conducted the largest airmovement in support of domestic operations in the history of the Florida National Guard and executed a Tiger Dam installation for the first time ever. While our response up to this point has been historic in its scope, our commitment to aid our civilian partners over the long haul will likewise need to be one for the record books.

As I have toured the affected areas with the Governor over the past few days, I have seen first-hand the level of devastation suffered by communities like Fort Myers, Fort Myers Beach, Northport, Arcadia Sanibel and Pine Islands and others. The magnitude of the damage these counties sustained is monstrous in comparison to what we have seen with other hurricanes over the past decade.

Governor Ron DeSantis and I have witnessed how your presence and hard work can inspire our residents and provide hope that their lives can -- and will -- get back to normal. I thank

you for the hard work you have already done, and I thank you in advance for your willingness to serve our state as our response to Hurricane Ian continues over the coming weeks. Our state knows that we will serve for as long as we're needed.

MINUTES OF GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING



MINUTES OF LAST MEETING: Minutes of last meeting conducted on August 25, 2022, were presented by Chairman Dudley. Copies of Minutes and Agenda are available on the sign-in table and were sent to members electronically by the Secretary. The minutes were approved by voice vote with no changes.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Treasurer John Mountcastle provided a detailed report showing that as of August 24, 2022, there was a balance of \$108,808.71 and as of September 30, 2022, there is balance of \$122,795.07. Appreciation was given to Chairman Dudley and David Shoar for reaching out to major donors, two of which donated contributions of \$10,000 each. This gives the Council an extra \$20,000 to help with the ever-rising costs of shelter expenses for our homeless veterans. A continued effort will continue to obtain funding from those "deep pocket" donors. A chart was provided to show that shelter costs for lodging homeless veterans exceeds 3x the other costs held by the Council. St. Johns County has become a very expensive to temporarily house of veterans. The Council's credit card was used \$4,554.05 in September, payments were made continuously to keep the credit card active and up to date. There is now a \$776.53 balance due on the credit card by October 20, 2022. The Treasurer's Report was approved by voice vote with no changes.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

VETERANS SERVICE OFFICER UPDATE, JOSEPH MCDERMOTT

Mr. McDermott spoke of the major push that is being put on to try to come up with transition housing for the Veterans in our area and the need for such housing. It's not cheap to house these veterans in local hotels.

Mr. McDermott mentioned the upcoming Veterans Homeless Standdown that will be held on October 8, 2022, at 9:00 am at the Elks Lodge. Set up will be on Friday, October 7, 2022, at 9:15 am for volunteers that would like to help. Last year's turnout for the Standdown was a disappointment and hopes that will not happen again this year. Every homeless camp within the county was visited by the Veteran's Service Office but many were empty due to the flooding from the hurricane. Fliers and information were left at the camps and other locations throughout the county in hopes of better attendance this year.

The Veteran's Service Office had a very good year this year with a number of increase of clients searching for help. There were 70 new clients added. The VSO has a very good crew helping all the veterans in our county. VSO will keep working hard for our county Veterans.

On the side, the "Camp Lejeune Lawsuit" was discussed and how that effects the VA funds that are received.

VETERANS TREATMENT COURT, JOHN LESLIE

Mr. Leslie informed that the Treatment Court has graduated 62 members currently in its 6 years of existence. There are 112 veterans that have been inducted. There have been 14 that have left the program, 2 by death. The court has been going very well and is successful. The Mentor Corp is growing and may be adding one more that was a recent graduate. It's a good way for the graduates to stay engaged in the court system. Next session is October 7, 2022, at the Courthouse Annex and is open to the public. The Treatment Court participants can achieve their community service credits by volunteering in events such as the Veterans Homeless Standdown and 7 are going help with this year's event.

NEW BUSINESS:

Vice Chairman Ray Quinn spoke for "Wreaths Across America" to place wreaths on the graves of our Veterans in the oldest National Cemetery in America here in St. Augustine. A handout was provided for donations. The price of the wreaths has not changed, \$15 per wreath, if you purchase two, the sponsor gets an additional wreath – so that is three wreaths for \$30. We need to raise \$12,000 and need more sales to get a wreath on every headstone. Saturday, December 17th is when the wreaths will be placed. Volunteers will place the wreaths at the event. Everyone and their families are invited to attend.

Chairman Dudley spoke about the Veterans that we are helping in homeless situations within the county. St. Johns County is one of the richest in the state and has the least amount of affordable housing for our Veterans. Many agencies are helping to find housing and affordable housing just cannot be found in SJC. Expenses to house our homeless veterans are too high and the county has to come around in some way to assist in helping these veterans. If it were not for the Veteran's Council, there would be no help for these homeless veterans. Patriot Place update was given and the problems they are running into getting a Certificate of Occupancy. San Marco Heights is a new development that is supposed to have 10 units within the complex to help with veteran housing needs.

Erick Saks, Operation Lifeline, new nonprofit here in SJC. Their focus is on improving veterans housing. Will help veterans with needs by helping repairs and rehab to homeowner veterans in the lower income bracket.

Meeting adjourned at 8:00 pm.

POW for 5+ years, 4.5 years of this time was spent in solitary confinement in a cell with a 5' X 8' footprint. The Installation shares Ted's story of grief and bravery against overwhelming odds, cruelty and hopelessness. The images include memorabilia, artifacts and artworks of Ted's incarceration, the Vietnam War and his life thereafter. Thank you to all the individuals that have made this effort possible. We started the H4V Peer2Peer Therapeutic Art Program in Jacksonville at Cohen A Stevens Veteran Center and they supported us by sponsoring art supplies and their facilities. Other Veteran Organizations want to strengthen the military women population in Volusia and St John County also. H4V was asked to start a 6 week program in-person for Military women veterans and Spouses in 3 counties. Starting at the end of January 2023 we would like to offer a group in St Augustine and in Volusia county collaborating with MOAA and Counselors in the area. Duval county will be offered again at Steven A Cohen Veteran Centerstone.

We are always seeking volunteer military women that have backgrounds in facilitating, art and any other holistic way to help military women. If your interested in being a volunteer or teach a class for January class in either Volusia / St John or Duval counties or would like to participate please email me at Lgeiser@Hope4veterans.org or check out our website@ www.Hope4veterans.org

Art Therapy for Military Women

Purpose: Art Therapy to build a special connection between our military sisters. Bring a small group military woman together to prevent isolation and suicide but also to feel safe, comfortable, and fun to start sharing any struggles they may need help with. Connecting them to resources that are needed such as counseling, claims and financial. Women struggle seeking help but when you bring fun social activities women tend to come together and talk with one another.

Time Frame: Art therapy class would be 2-3hrs depending on intensity and struggles within the group. Allowing 1-1.5 hours to allow our military Women to explore their unconscious and struggles through art. 1.5 hours to reconnect after the project in a small group to talk about their projects. It will vary depending on where the military women are and what stages of recovery they are at, but we will meet them at where they are at.

Materials: Military Women can use any of the tools to create their masterpiece. Tools may include paint, canvas, scissors, magazine clippings, pastel, pencils, colored pencils, art products such as masks, clothing, and any safe products to be creative with their masterpiece. Tools will be provided by Hope4veterans and the community. We will be offered a few small projects to lead to a masterpiece.

Vision in the group: During the 1.5 hours they can explore their art ideas with the help of facilitators and counselors. After the 1.5 hours we come together in a small group for 1.5 hours to encourage them to talk about what they did as a project, how they felt and what are some thoughts that came up while drawing, writing or any art project that they started. If they struggle or are not ready to tell, ask permission if we can ask the group what they think of the art project. Share around the room. Encourage each woman if they felt they enjoyed the group next session to bring other military women to the group and/or ideas for art they would love to try or learn. Our goal is to bring women together and prevent isolation and suicide. Ask military women to help the group by utilizing their skills and talents. Hope4veterans also provides monthly meet & greets and/or fun activities for our women and 1-2 events per year for our families.

Group rules: Positive encouragement, clean up your area, encourage participation by bringing in fun ideas and allowing women to lead the project in some classes.

Other Creative ideas: Can add exterior/interior masks, Lanterns, Mandala, dreamcatcher, Wine glass art, Art Journaling, Paint to music, Vision board, Tie Blankets, Jewelry making, Mind mapping, egg painting, Family tree, Rock

Paintings, Forgiveness letters, Dream Drawing, Tile Art, Collage your vision and goals. Snow globes, Canvas bag art, pre drawn art add your touch.

Other additional: teaching mediation, breathing techniques, and other forms of relaxation before and after depending on the group dynamics.

Women Peer2Peer Therapeutic Art

6 week class over 3 month time frame (Every 2 weeks)

- 1. First meeting Art therapy
 - A. Group rules/ Instructions
 - B. Pre-Questionnaire/ survey
 - C. Journal/ Fancy Pen- given for projects outside class and resources
 - D. Break ice introduction/activities- Unmasking
 - E. H4V bring plain sketch pictures to color and write notes
 - F. Art support group talk about colors, meaning, feelings and thoughts/ Ice breaking
- 1. Second meeting Art therapy
 - A. Work on a tree adding growth/ positive journey
 - B. Adding your own Art with all Art tools provided/pencil/color/paint/cutting
 - C. Bring in next session a photo and/or inspiration quote that resonates toward growth
 - D. Art Support group talk about drawings, positive feedback, and meanings and next week project
- Third meeting Art Therapy
 - A. Jewelry- inspiration positive words bracelet or necklace
 - B. Wine Painting/Glass painting/ Canvas painting
 - C. Art Support Group talks about art projects. Feelings, thoughts, and our goals/vision next week
- Fourth meeting Art Therapy
 - A. Vision/ Goal Board positive affirmation
 - B. Drawing bubbles positive affirmations

- C. Art Support group talk about art project, feelings, thoughts and next week project
- 4. Fifth meeting Art therapy
 - A. Building trust in group- group member suggestion teaches an activity
 - B. Affirmation Jar
 - C. Art Support group talk about art project, feelings thoughts and next week project
- 5. Sixth week Art Therapy
 - A. Post survey/ questionnaire
 - B. Tell her story by art/ writing work as a team
 - C. Additional hands-on projects group decides
 - D. Art support talk about art project, feelings, thoughts, and future connections/events

During these 6 weeks our goal is build connection and trust within our group; Women Veterans and Women Spouses, to understand unconsciously, her strengths and challenges through Therapeutic art. As the founder and a Women Veteran herself, she went through Art therapy which discovered her unconscious emotions and thoughts. Each time she sees awareness within her artwork and others. She saw a positive change and self confidence within her clients and herself. Combining Peer2Peer Sister, Social monthly fun events, Therapeutic art and helping our women obtain the benefits they deserve and earned. Statistics have been shown by word of mouth and surveys to improve health and well-being. Hope4Veterans goals is to prevent isolation, homelessness, and suicide for our Women Veterans in Florida. That includes finding our military women.

Therapeutic Art Projects is geared to Honor, recognize, and hear HER voice in March and November Fundraiser/ gala events each year. In the Gala we will display their Therapeutic Art and be recognized for their art (Pinning them at the gala – Dog tags (Women Veteran Proud). Our counselors help bring awareness and walk them through any struggles or challenges they may face and if they need more 1 one 1 then we have the option because we have a counselor at the end of sessions.







How the PACT Act is Already Helping Veterans

Veterans are applying for benefits and VA is expediting delivery

The PACT Act is a historic new law that will help VA provide health care and benefits to millions of toxic-exposed Veterans and their survivors. Since President Biden signed the PACT Act into law on August 10, VA has been hard at work implementing this landmark bipartisan legislation—and Veterans have already begun to apply for the benefits they've earned and deserve.

Here's an update on what's happened since August 10th:

Veterans are applying for the PACT Act benefits they deserve

The day after the PACT Act was signed into law (August 11), Veterans set an all-time record for filing online disability compensation claims. Since the PACT Act was signed, Veterans have filed more than 200,000 total claims—an increase of more than 21% over the same period last year. And to date, VA has already received more than 70,000 PACT Act-related claims from Veterans since August 10.

Thousands of Veterans participated in toxic exposure screening pilot

As a part of the PACT Act, VA will begin providing 5-minute toxic exposure screenings to all Veterans enrolled in VA health care. On September 6, VA began a pilot of this program—screening 13,380 Veterans across 12 medical centers over a 2-week period, and finding a 37.4% concern of exposure among those Veterans. These results will help VA make toxic exposure screenings available to all Veterans in early November, and more importantly, make sure that VA provides all toxic-exposed Veterans with the care they need and the benefits they deserve.

VA expedited the timeline to deliver benefits to Veterans as soon as possible

Instead of phasing-in conditions over the coming years (as outlined in the legislation), the Biden Administration decided to make all conditions in the PACT Act presumptive for benefits as of August 10, the day the bill was signed into law. We will begin processing these benefits on the earliest date possible, which is January 1.

VA will expand health care eligibility in October

On October 1, VA will expand and extend eligibility for VA health care for certain Veterans of the Gulf Wars and post-9/11 era. This expansion will increase health care eligibility for hundreds of thousands of toxic-exposed Veterans. Additionally, VA has already expanded health care eligibility for certain Veterans of the Vietnam War. More detailed information about this expansion can be found on VA.gov/PACT.

Meeting Veterans where they are

Within minutes of the PACT Act passing the Senate, VA launched VA.gov/PACT—a one-stop-shop website where Veterans and their families can learn about the PACT Act and apply for health care or benefits. This website, which is available in English and Spanish, has garnered nearly 2.5 million views to date.

Boeing to do an additional \$264 million worth of work on Super Hornets and Growlers in Jacksonville

Boeing Co will do about \$264 million worth of work on the Navy's Super Hornets and Growlers in Jacksonville over the coming two years.

The St. Louis company received two contracts from the Naval Supply Systems Command Weapon Systems Support division for the projects, which will also see work done in Missouri and other locations.

Both contracts are for repairs of flight control surfaces on the aircraft.

The first is a \$168.8 million contract for work on two specific flight control surfaces on the F/A-18E/F and the E/A-18G aircraft. About 70% of the contract will be done in Jacksonville, with the project wrapping up by September 2024.

The F/A-18 is a multirole fighter known as the Super Hornet and comes in a one and two-seat variant. The E/A-19, known as the Growler, is an electronic warfare aircraft that replaced the EA-6B Prowler.

The second contract is for \$191.8 million and will see the company work on multiple flight control surfaces on the aircraft.

About 76% of the work will be done in Jacksonville, with the job expected to be complete by July 2025.

Meanwhile, work is underway on an expansion of Boeing's operation at Cecil Airport, with the construction of a 394,000-square-foot facility that Jacksonville Aviation Authority CEO Mark VanLoh has called "one of the most significant in the JAA's history."

The \$116.5 million hangar and office facility at Cecil is on schedule and set to be

fully operational in January 2024, the company said.

Work done at the new operation will include maintenance on F-18 aircrafts as well as Boeing's P-8 Poseidon and C-40.

"There is a talent pool here that is growing. This is meant to be another center of aerospace," Boeing Global Services CEO Ted Colbert III said at the time of the groundbreaking. "We want to be here, and we want to help in that growth plan."

Boeing is also looking to build a 146,000-square-foot a components operations facility at the site.

"It's growth upon growth," Emmanuel Tormes, senior manager for government operations at Boeing, told the Business Journal earlier this year.

The recently awarded flight control surface contracts are just the most recent received by the aircraft giant: In January, it received a similar \$106 million contract, and in May had its contract to provide depot-level maintenance and modification work on the aircraft increased by \$95 million.



James "Jimmy" Maitland Stewart

James "Jimmy" Maitland Stewart was born in May 1908 in Indiana, Pennsylvania, to Elizabeth and Alexander Stewart. After earning a degree in architecture from Princeton University in 1932, the future star helped prepare a show for Broadway with the University Players based in Falmouth, Massachusetts, because he didn't believe many jobs would be available to him. This experience led to his passion for acting and started a 56-year career in show business.

In 1935, Stewart began acting with Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, where he starred in many films during the Golden Age with actors such as Ginger Rogers and Clark Gable. He later signed a contract with the talent agency Music Corporation of America and completed films such as "Mr. Smith Goes to Washington" and "It's a Wonderful Life." He received various accolades during his acting career, including two Academy Awards and two Golden Globe Awards.

From a young age, Stewart had a passion for aviation, too, and he obtained his private pilot's license at the age of 27. In March 1941, he was drafted into the Army, but was deemed unfit because he did not meet the weight requirement. A short time later, he enlisted into the Army Air Corps and was able to follow in the footsteps of his family: Stewart's father and grandfather both served in the military.


The young actor completed basic training at Moffett Field, California. Despite his desire to fly overseas, he remained stateside, training pilots until he was finally able to travel to England as a captain with the Eighth Air Force. By the end of World War II, he had completed 20 combat missions as the leader of a squadron of B-24's, received two Distinguished Flying Crosses and the Croix de Guerre while earning the rank of colonel.

After the Air Force became an independent branch of the military, Stewart continued his military career in the Air Force Reserve and showcased his expertise in aviation in some of his films. Following more than 27 years in the military, he retired in May 1968 with the rank of brigadier general. He was awarded a Presidential Medal of Freedom by President Ronald Reagan in 1985.

Stewart married Gloria Hatrick McLean in 1949, and the two remained together for 45 years, until Gloria died in 1994. He had four children: two twin daughters and two stepsons, one of whom died in the Vietnam War.


Stewart died in July 1997.





Please write your federal legislators (Congressmen and Senators) requesting they support the Coast Guard Authorization Act of 2022.

First, a little history: During the 35-day shutdown between December 2018 and January 2019, the U.S. Coast Guard continued to work without compensation, providing vital services which safeguarded our nation's coastline and waterways. The Veterans' Council of St. Johns County, Inc. contributed \$500, and, by working with the USO at Mayport and local Navy League Chapters, worked to provide other emergency aid to local Coast Guard members.

This bill, introduced into the US Senate (S. 4802) on Sept. 8, includes a sorely-needed provision (§256) to ensure members of the U.S. Coast Guard continue to receive pay and allowances during a government shutdown. While members serving under the Department of Defense already have this benefit, the Coast Guard is under the Department of Homeland Security and, until this pending legislation, does not enjoy the same protection of the benefits to which they would otherwise be entitled.

This bill, which covers the service's funding through Fiscal Year 2023 (starting Oct. 1), also includes improvements for Coast Guard families which are critical for retention.

The Veterans' Council of St. Johns County, Inc. advocates providing Coast Guard military personnel with the same benefits and emoluments enjoyed by those serving in the military services under the Department of Defense. Educating our elected officials about existing inequities, such as discussed above, and encouraging their support of the Coast Guard Authorization Act of 2022, perhaps the Coast Guard military personnel will be treated as their Department of Defense counterparts.



VA SURVIVOR BENEFITS & THE PACT ACT

ESGR4U

You may be eligible for VA benefits and services after your loved one has passed.



The PACT Act makes it easier for many survivors to receive Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC).

VA will be contacting survivors who were previously denied DIC benefits and may be newly eligible under the PACT Act. You do not need to wait for VA to contact you to submit a claim.

How to Apply for DIC and/or Accrued Benefits

Surviving family members may apply for these benefits using the appropriate VA form on va.gov/family-member-benefits.



Dependency and Indemnity Compensation

Monthly payment for the eligible surviving spouse, dependent children or parent(s) of the Veteran or service member IF Veteran or service member died in the line of duty or due to a service-related injury or illness.



Accrued Benefits

A one-time payment to a surviving spouse, dependent child(ren) or dependent parent(s) of a deceased Veteran based on relationship when the record shows additional benefits (such as VA compensation or pension) due to the Veteran prior to passing.

Additional Survivor Benefits Available:



Burials and Burial Allowance

Burial benefits available include a gravesite in any of our National cemeteries with available space, opening and closing of the grave, perpetual care, a government headstone, marker, or medallion, a burial flag, and a Presidential Memorial Certificate, at no cost. Some survivors may also be eligible for a plot allowance, transportation allowance, and burial allowances based on the service connected disability status of the deceased Veteran.



Final Monthly Payment

If a Veteran who is receiving VA compensation or pension benefits passes away, their last month of benefits can be paid to their surviving spouse.



Home Loan Guaranty

Certificate of Eligibility is available for surviving spouses receiving DIC.



Education and Training

Chapter 35 benefits and Fry Scholarship are the two main GI Bill programs offering educational assistance to survivors and dependents of Veterans who died in the line of duty or as a result of service-related disabilities.



Health Care

Survivors and dependents of Veterans may qualify for health care benefits, such as CHAMPVA.

BATTLE CREEK, Mich. (WOOD) — A veteran in Battle Creek not only reached an amazing milestone Thursday, he also celebrated it by going back to what he did decades ago.

Retired Col. Robert "Bob" Munie served in the U.S. Army during World War II in the European theater and then reenlisted in the Air Force in 1953. He lived through it all, even to his 100th birthday. He told Retired Air Force Col. Frank J. Walker that his wish for his special day was to simply serve again.



"That just tells you what kind of patriot he is," Walker said.

Retired Col. Robert "Bob" Munie was surprised on his 100th.

Not only was it granted, but he was also warmly greeted by family and military members outside his home at Lakeview Assisted Living in Battle Creek. Walker said Munie did more than serve under two military branches. "He went on to work in the Department of Defense for 49 years," Walker said. "Then every time I came out here (to Lakeview Assisted Living), he was in a World War II hat. (He is) proud of his service. So what else can we do?"

For starters, "Happy Birthday" was sung to Munie, and his grandson currently serving in the Army National Guard helped him put on a tailored Air Force uniform.

Michigan's newest centenarian was also gifted his special wish. Munic received an order from the Michigan Active-Duty General, the highest-ranking officer in the state of Michigan, making him active duty for the day as an honorary member "in good standing" of the Michigan National Guard. He was not just reenlisted, but also given a promotion higher than his previous rank of colonel.

Grand Rapids' Veterans Memorial Park to get café supporting vets. "Know ye, that reposing special trust and confidence, and the patriotism, valor, fidelity and ability of Robert Francis Munie, I do hereby appoint you technical sergeant in the Michigan Air National Guard effective the sixth of October 2022," read the proclamation from the Michigan Active-Duty General's office.

The ceremony included many presentations, as well as a key to the city of Battle Creek from Mark Behnke and a special two-plane flyover by the Hooligan Flight Team. Munic also received many gifts, including a month's salary in 1953 money — representing the year he re-enlisted with the Air Force — which came to just more than \$130.

"This is small compared to all of the accomplishments he has done," Walker said. "So it is my privilege and our privilege to make his dream come true." Munie was given a couple of "tasks" by Walker. One of them is that whenever Walker visits, Munie must be in uniform.


When asked what his favorite part of the surprise was, Munie said four simple words: "It was all good."

Are You eligible to file for benefits based on Presumptive Exposure?

Were you exposed to hazardous materials while serving in the military, such as from Agent Orange or burn pits? Did you serve in Vietnam, Thailand or Southwest Asia? If so, you may be eligible to file for service-connected benefits based on presumptive exposure.

Over the course of the last six months, VA has begun processing service-connected disability claims for six new presumptive conditions related to exposure to hazardous materials.

In May 2021, VA started implementing provisions of the William M. Thornberry National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2021 (NDAA), adding bladder cancer, hypothyroidism and Parkinsonism to the list of medical conditions presumptively associated with exposure to Agent Orange. A few months later, VA added asthma, rhinitis and sinusitis (to include rhinosinusitis) on a presumptive basis based on particulate matter exposures during military service in Southwest Asia and certain other areas.

Any Veteran who was previously denied service-connection for any of these six conditions but had symptoms manifest within 10 years of military service would need to file another claim. Be sure to use VA Form 20-0995, "Decision Review Request: Supplemental Claim" when filing. The claim form should include the name of the medical condition and also specify that the medical condition is being claimed due to in-service exposure to environmental hazards.






