Presentation ceremony was held on Monday, September 9

On Monday, September 9, at 4:30pm in The Alcazar Room of City Hall, the City of St. Augustine City Commission recognized William "Bill" Dudley, presenting him with the city's highest honor, the Order of La Florida Award, for his selfless devotion of his time and talent to the welfare and betterment of our citizens, and his extraordinary service to our community.

City to recognize William "Bill" Dudley with Order of La Florida Award

**Bill Dudley** 

Nominated by Mayor Nancy Sikes-Kline, Dudley exemplifies the qualifications of being nominated for the award, unselfishly devoting himself, his time, and his talent to the welfare and betterment of our citizens and contributing extraordinary services to this community, in particular his work with the military and our veterans.

Dudley joined the U.S. Air Force in January 1955, flying and instructing in various types of military aircraft and deploying

during the Berlin Crisis and the Cuban Missile Crisis. After 10 years of active duty, he transferred to the USAF Reserves, retiring at the rank of Lt. Colonel. Dudley held executive-level management positions for several major domestic and international airlines before running an aerospace consulting business.

Since he fully retired in 2005, Dudley has served our local community, our veterans in particular, in many ways – as the National Director of the U.S. Navy League, the President of the Veterans Council of St. Johns County, and in various voluntary leadership roles with the National Cemetery, community veterans organizations, Flagler Health's Continuum of Care, Home Again St. Johns, Veterans Treatment Court Advisory Board, and more.

The City of St. Augustine established The Order of La Florida Award in 1975, so that the City Commission, on behalf of the people of St. Augustine might recognize one who, "...over a long period of time has unselfishly devoted his or her time and talent to the welfare and betterment of St. Augustine's citizens and heritage, who has exemplified the finest qualities of citizenship, and has contributed extraordinary services to the community." Recipients must be 55 years of age and there may not be more than 10 living recipients at any one time. A nomination originates with a member of the city commission and is presented to the city manager who then puts it before the entire commission for confirmation.

BUNNELL, Fla. – We are thrilled to announce this year's Grand Marshal is Commissioner Randy Stapleford, Captain, US Navy (Ret.), a decorated veteran with over 31 years of active-duty service to our nation.

2024 Grand Marshal: Captain Randy Stapleford, US Navy (Ret.)

Captain Stapleford served with distinction during a remarkable military career, accumulating:

- 13 years of sea duty

- Over 7,000 flight hours

- More than 725 carrier arrested landings

Throughout his Navy tenure, he held several critical leadership positions, including:

- Commander of an aviation squadron
- Nuclear Advisor to the Commander-in-Chief
- Naval Attaché to the U.S. Embassy in Ottawa, Canada
- Director of the Naval War College's International Naval Staff College

- Commanding Officer and Professor of Naval Sciences at Carnegie Mellon University

Following his honorable retirement, Captain Stapleford continued serving his country through the U.S. Department of State, where he was the Iraq Country Coordinator for Antiterrorism Assistance under Secretary Condoleezza Rice. He also expanded his role as Country Coordinator for the Republic of the Philippines, where he collaborated with the President of the Philippines to establish the nation's first National-level Antiterrorism Assistance Task Force.

In addition to his international service, Captain Stapleford remained dedicated to public service at home. He served as Military and Veterans Affairs aide to three U.S. Congressmen: Jason Altmire, Ron DeSantis, and currently Michael Waltz. Locally, he plays an integral role as a member of the Flagler County Veterans Advisory Council, working closely with veterans' organizations to ensure they receive the resources and support they deserve.

In 2021, Governor Ron DeSantis appointed him to serve as the Flagler County Commissioner for the Florida Inland Navigation District (FIND). Through this role, Captain Stapleford helped secure over \$1.1 million in waterway grants for Flagler County and its cities.

Captain Stapleford holds a Master's degree in National Security & Strategic Studies and a Master's in Business Management. A lifetime advocate for veterans, he is actively involved in organizations such as Disabled American Veterans, Vietnam Veterans of America, the American Legion, and the Military Officers Association of America.

In 2023, Captain Stapleford was honored as the Veteran of the Year. He and his wife, Rhonda, are proud parents of two daughters, Heather and Allison, and recently welcomed their grandson, Benjamin Randall, into the family.

#### K9s for Warriors planning Ponte Vedra expansion

#### The nonprofit intends to add a veterinarian clinic for its service dogs.

Military service dog trainer and provider K9s for Warriors wants to expand its Ponte Vedra "mega kennel" location.

The St. Johns River Water Management District and St. Johns County are reviewing plans for the project.

K9s for Warriors is planning to add a 4,300-square-foot military veterinarian clinic for its service dogs at 70 Warrior Way between U.S. 1 and Nocatee Parkway in Ponte Vedra.

It is proposed to be a 4,300-square-foot military veterinarian clinic for its service dogs at 70 Warrior Way between U.S. 1 and Nocatee Parkway. The site plans show 23 parking spaces.

K9s for Warriors, through K9s for Warriors Inc., owns the land. CHW Professional Consultants of Alachua is the civil engineer. Gainesville-based Walker Architects is the architect.

According to k9sforwarriors.org, Shari Duval founded K9s for Warriors in 2011 to train and pair service dogs with veterans with military-related traumas. Duval's son Brett was a civilian K9 bomb dog handler who returned from Iraq with post-traumatic stress disorder.

K9s for Warriors is planning to add a 4,300-square-foot veterinarian clinic at its Ponte Vedra location for its service dogs.

"Doctors couldn't help her son, but she found that a Service Dog could. Shari found a new mission in life: to put all her time and resources into helping restore her son's life and the lives of returning combat Veterans through the use of Service Dogs," according to the website.

It says K9s for Warriors has paired 1,000 veterans with service dogs.

K9s for Warriors is a 501(c)(3) organization. In addition to the Ponte Vedra location, it has two facilities in San Antonio, Texas.

# 'A friend to us all': Local D-Day veteran who shared story of service, survival dies at 99



# ST. JOHNS COUNTY, Fla. – Herbert

Griffin, the local D-Day veteran who shared his story of service and survival with News4JAX and other media outlets died Wednesday, according to Doug Myers, president of Jax Home Health, Inc.

Griffin was 99 years old.

In an email to News4JAX Wednesday morning, Myers wrote: "He was not only a true American hero, but a friend to us all. He will be missed!"

News4JAX spoke to Griffin a number of times, most recently ahead of Veterans Day in 2021. During that interview, Griffin shared how he was 18 years old on June 6, 1944, the invasion of Normandy.

"They didn't tell us nothing about the invasion, not a thing," Griffin said. "They kept us in the dark."

During his interview with News4JAX, Griffin vividly recalled landing at Utah Beach. He shared how he and his fellow soldiers of the 79th Infantry Division could hear the gunfire, knowing they would soon be exposed to the Nazis.

"There in the bunkers, they had machine guns and mortars and all that. So, we had no protection," Griffin recalled vividly. "The sergeant said, 'Get off the beach! Get off the beach!'" Griffin said the enemy fired over their heads, leaving him wondering if he'd make it out alive. At one point during the fighting, Griffin suffered a devasting injury, one that nearly cost him his arm. He was in and out of hospitals overseas and in the U.S. for a year before he was discharged from Waco, Texas. The trauma stayed with him for the remaining years of his life.

"I have nightmares sometimes about what happened, and I wake up in a real bad sweat," Griffin said. "I've tried to overcome that."

Griffin earned several medals, including a Bronze Star and a Purple Heart for the severe injury he suffered.

"All of that wasn't in vain, it was worthwhile," Griffin said. "I love my country, and I'd go back today if I could."

Griffin got that chance in 2014. The St. Johns County Fire Department gifted him the trip of a lifetime. They sent him back to Normandy for the 70th anniversary of D-Day. His brother, a fellow veteran, went with him.

"I enjoyed the second time much more than the first time," Griffin said. "It's something I'll never forget."

News4JAX is not currently aware of any plans for Griffin's funeral.

## A Navy veteran went from making six figures to being homeless. A Jacksonville nonprofit helped him find a new home

### Patriot Spring on Market will bring 17 affordable homes to Springfield by 2025

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. – A Navy veteran who went from making six figures to being homeless for nine years finally has a new home thanks to a Jacksonville nonprofit.

The nonprofit plans to create 17 safe, clean, and affordable homes in the historic Springfield neighborhood. It already started the restoration process at the 100-year-old Lauderdale Apartment Buildings.

But just across the Mathews Bridge at Patriot Plaza in Arlington sits the nonprofit's first Jacksonville property.

Derrick Wilkes said he went from the Navy to a banking executive making over \$100,000, to divorced and homeless for nine years with a brief prison stint in between.

He's said he's still getting used to his new home.

"Oh man, Friday, when I got the keys and...I was sitting here, and I kept looking around and, you know I sat there for a little, and I just couldn't believe it," Wilkes said.

Wilkes said he wouldn't be in his home without the help of Patriot Services Group. He contacted them on Wednesday and got his keys by Friday.

"This is something I never thought would happen to me," Wilkes said. "I had a 5,000 square foot house at the intercoastal with the boat dock, and I was making six figures and just to lose all that."

Paul Anderson, the Executive Director of Patriot Services Group said a lot of empathy goes into the work they do.

"We hear a Derrick story, I will say, hundreds of times a year. I was stable. One bad thing happened to me in my life and led me down this path, and trying to get out of it is hard," Anderson said. "And if you're homeless, it's almost impossible. So what we do is we provide the landing pad, and even if this is your temporary home or your forever home, we provide the resources that they need or will link them to the resources." But there's more work to be done.

The nonprofit's newest \$2.8 million project, Patriot Spring on Market, will bring nearly 20 more affordable homes to the community by 2025.

It will operate similarly to where Wilkes lives in Patriot Plaza.

You don't have to be a U.S. veteran to apply. You just have to make 30% of the area's median income to be approved.

"We've gone all the way to the level of asbestos removal...but we're starting construction this week, and we are proud to launch this program that we're going to be having here," Anderson said.

He said in a lot of cases, their properties are some of the last affordable housing options available to people at risk of homelessness.

"It's providing housing to people that may not qualify for a normal landlord," Anderson said. "They may have a charge from seven years ago, but yet it's showing on their record they've been a good member of the community, we look past that."

Wilkes said Patriot Services Group went the extra mile.

U.S. Marine Captain Ron Forrester laid to rest after 50 years

Captain Ron Forrester finally laid to rest at National Cemetery

ODESSA, Texas (KOSA) - After more than 50 years of uncertainty, U.S. Marine Corps Captain Ron Forrester, who had been missing in action since the Vietnam War, was finally laid to rest at Arlington National Cemetery on Monday (10/7/24). His long-awaited homecoming



brought both peace and pain to his family, marking the end of an emotional chapter that had remained open for decades.

Forrester's daughter, Karoni Forrester, spoke about the significance of the moment. "I don't know that there is such a thing as closure because the loss continues, but that torment that comes with not knowing what happened to him has gone, and I'm grateful for that. So grateful," she said.

Captain Forrester, originally from Odessa, Texas, was piloting an A-6A Intruder aircraft on a nighttime combat mission over northern Vietnam in 1972. Accompanied by co-pilot Captain Ralph Jim Chipman, the plane vanished without a trace. Despite search efforts, the U.S. military declared both men killed in action in 1978, six years after their disappearance.

For decades, their whereabouts remained a mystery. It wasn't until 2023 that the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency made a break-through, identifying Captain Forrester's remains through DNA testing and a gas card found at the crash site. Captain Chipman's remains had been identified earlier, and he was laid to rest in Utah on Veter ans Day 2023.

Karoni Forrester expressed gratitude to the team that worked tirelessly to recover her father's remains, acknowledging the immense effort that went into the discovery. "This team of people was working in 120-130 degree temperatures, digging in a rice paddy. It was such a gift for me to meet them, hug them, and thank them for changing my life and my family's life," she said.

Now, after 331 days since his remains were identified, Captain Ron Forrester was laid to rest at Arlington National Cemetery alongside other American heroes. Karoni shared her pride in seeing her father honored in this way.

"For him to be laid to rest with all those heroes really represents the cost of freedom. It's incredible to know that he's there, and that's very much where he belongs."

Despite the relief of finding peace for her own family, Karoni Forrester is mindful of the many families still awaiting answers. There are still 1,574 service members listed as missing from the Vietnam War. Karoni hopes the work of the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency will continue, so more families can find the peace her family now has.

Captain Forrester's legacy, she hopes, will live on and inspire others for years to come.

## Popular kiosks returned to VA Clinics

WASHINGTON — The freestanding kiosks that veterans used to submit travel expenses for medical care at Department of Veterans Affairs clinics and hospitals have returned a year after the VA closed them nationwide for an online system plagued with problems.

More than 750 kiosks are being reactivated at VA clinics and hospitals, with plans to add dozens more at VA facilities across the country, according to the agency. The VA will again accept mail-in paper forms for remittance of travel costs.

The popular claims reimbursement program paid out \$1.3 billion in 2022 to cover fuel costs, tolls, parking and in some cases airfare that veterans incur commuting to medical appointments, the VA said. But problems with a new online system that replaced the kiosks confused and frustrated veterans, according to lawmakers and veterans.

"Personally, I feel the VA wanted to make the [online] reimbursement process more difficult to discourage veterans from using it," said Marine Corps veteran David Seward, 53, who drives 30 minutes to the Pittsburgh VA Medical Center for medical care. "In my view, [the VA] made everything burdensome for the veteran to avoid spending more money." Jon Retzer, assistant national legislative director of Disabled American Veterans, said his organization has urged the VA to make the online process easier for veterans but also to continue providing the service at kiosks and by postal service.

Veterans are reimbursed for their travel expenses to doctor's appointments for treatment of service-connected injuries and illnesses. Veterans traveling for a compensation or pension exam also can submit their travel costs. In November 2020, the VA began phasing out the kiosks as it introduced the online program called the Beneficiary Travel Self Service System.

"We have heard feedback from many veterans who prefer the kiosks, and we are exploring ways that we can meet these specific veteran needs," said Terrence Hayes, the VA press secretary. The inspector general review faulted the VA for not soliciting veteran feedback as it introduced the new system or providing training to veterans on how to enter claims correctly.

#### Andersonvolle National Historic Site

On October 16, 1970, Public Law 91-465, also known as the Andersonville National Historic Site Authorization Act, authorized the establishment of Andersonville National Historic Site. The legislation's purpose was to:

- · Provide an understanding of the overall prisoner of war story of the Civil War,
- · Interpret the role of prisoner of war camps in history,
- · Commemorate the sacrifice of Americans who lost their lives in such camps,
- · Preserve the monuments located therein.

Today, Andersonville National Historic Site includes the National Prisoner of War Museum, the Historic Prison Site, and Andersonville National Cemetery and has seen over 7 million visitors.

The Andersonville National Historic Site, located near Andersonville, Georgia, preserves the former Andersonville Prison (also known as Camp Sumter), a Confederate prisoner-of-war camp during the final fourteen months of the American Civil War. Most of the site lies in southwestern Macon County, adjacent to the east side of the town of Andersonville. The site also contains the Andersonville National Cemetery and the National Prisoner of War Museum. The prison was created in February 1864 and served until April 1865.

The site was commanded by Captain Henry Wirz, who was tried and executed after the war for war crimes. The prison was overcrowded to four times its capacity, and had an inadequate water supply, inadequate food, and unsanitary conditions. Of the approximately 45,000 Union prisoners held at Camp Sumter during the war, nearly 13,000 (28%) died. The chief causes of death were scurvy, diarrhea, and dysentery.



### The National Museum of the US Navy

WASHINGTON — A new national museum for the U.S. Navy is planned for outside the historic Washington Navy Yard to give the public unfettered access to the sea service's history. The museum will be built at Tingey Street and M Street near the Washington Nationals baseball stadium, the Navy announced in a ceremony Friday at the new site. The museum is meant to replace the existing Navy National Museum located on base at the Navy Yard, which is largely off limits to the general public. "The new National Museum of the U.S. Navy will provide a dramatically improved opportunity for the American public to be inspired by the long history of valor and sacrifice of American sailors in the defense of our country, and to learn the vital importance of sea power to our way of life," said retired Rear Adm. Samuel J. Cox, director of the Naval History and Heritage Command. "It will showcase not only the legacy of the past but also the global operations of the Navy today, upholding the freedom of the seas, upon which our freedom depends."

The Navy evaluated 18 cities and 42 sites as candidates for a new location of the national museum, according to Kristina Higgins, spokeswoman for the Naval History and Heritage Command. The Washington site beat out locations in San Diego, New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Boston and Norfolk. Each city was evaluated for attendance, market diversity, operating gap, cost per visitor, fundraising potential and capital costs.

Estimates indicate the new National Museum of the U.S. Navy campus could attract more than 1.5 million visitors annually, Higgins said. In May, the Navy signed a land-exchange agreement that paved the way for the location.

The state-of-the-art facility is planned to expand beyond a traditional museum to a campus layout that combines the museum, a high-tech conference center and retail space with dining options. The museum is intended to be a self-funded tourist destination that aims to intrigue, inform and inspire generations of visitors, according to the Naval History and Heritage Command. "The envisioned campus will serve as an educational, inspirational, cultural and ceremonial center for those serving in the Navy today. It would build public understanding of the Navy's rich history and proud heritage, offer educational activities and programming, and act as a backdrop for notable career events for active, Reserve and retiring personnel," Higgins said.

The construction of the museum is estimated to cost \$250 million, with opportunities for additional development that could total up to \$500 million, she said. To raise funds for the new museum, the Navy has partnered with the Navy Museum Development Foundation, a nonprofit organization dedicated to preserving naval history. A law also provides the opportunity for Congress to match funds raised by a nonprofit foundation for the purpose of financing a national museum.

The national museums of the Army, Marine Corps, and Air Force have all benefited from this statutory provision. The museum was first announced in 2020. The groundbreaking is planned for October 2025 coinciding with the Navy's 250th birthday. It is projected to open by 2030. "This ceremony marks a significant step forward in our journey to reimagine the Navy Museum," Navy Secretary Carlos Del Toro said. "This is a testament to our unwavering commitment to preserving and honoring the rich history of our Navy and to ensuring that its legacy continues to inspire and educate future generations."

**Military Support Retreat:** MSR is for the service member (any branch and any duty status) to attend WITH their primary adult support person (spouse, friend, partner,)

Family & Friends of the Fallen Support Retreat:

-This retreat supports those who lost a loved one in service to our nation and is open to all adult family members and/or those adults significantly impacted by the loss of the service member. The death can be from all conflicts/eras, all branches of service, and all circumstance of death.

-The retreat has a split focus on nature based recreation, creative arts, and interactive workshops and groups discussions with the goals of teaching supportive strategies & how to navigate challenges and to connect meaningfully with others at the re-treat.

-This experience is recommended for those 1 year or more away from their loss.

## How to report a Veteran's death to VA

The passing of a Veteran is a solemn time that deserves to be recognized and reported with the utmost respect. Veterans have served their country and worked hard for their well-deserved benefits.

However, after a Veteran passes away, family members should report the death of the Veteran to VA as soon as possible to stop current benefits payments. If the death is not reported promptly, survivors or executors of the Veteran's estate may have to repay any overpayments received. Payments the deceased Veteran received may include compensation, pension, education or Veteran Readiness & Employment benefits.

VA encourages loved ones of deceased Veterans to follow the guidance below on reporting Veteran deaths to avoid falling victim to benefit scams.

## How to report the death of a Veteran

Calling is the fastest way to report a Veteran's death so VA will stop benefit payments, but there are other options available for reporting.

## **Options for reporting:**

By Phone: Call VA 800-827-1000 (TTY: 711) and select 5. Agents are available Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. ET.

In Person: Go to a VA regional office. Find the nearest VA regional office.

By Mail: Department of Veterans Affairs Claims Intake Center, PO Box 4444, Janesville, WI 53547-4444. Include your relationship to the Veteran and any supporting documents that can help us verify the Veteran's identity. Examples of supporting documents are:

Death certificate or other public record of the Veteran's death

Discharge document (like a DD214)

If you report in person at a VA regional office or by mail, provide copies of:

Death certificate or other public record of the Veteran's death.

Discharge document (like a DD214).

Provide as much information about the Veteran as you can when you first report the notice of death to VA. This information will help VA verify the Veteran's identity. This information includes:

Full name.

Social Security Number or VA claim number.

Date of birth.

Date of death.

Branch of service.

## Best practices to avoid survivor benefit scams

Save important files, such as the Veteran's military service/treatment records, discharge papers and copies of their VA claims.

Go to the VA website. For guidance on creating an account and obtaining a VA security Personal Identification Number (PIN) to securely access benefit information. A VA Security PIN is an additional way to secure direct deposit accounts from theft and protect Personally Identifiable Information (PII).

Never give out PII via text, and be cautious of suspicious hyperlinks or unfamiliar hyperlinks.

If a survivor is missing a VA benefits payment, identifies a discrepancy in payments, or find suspicious activity with a direct deposit account, contact VA immediately at 800-827-1000.

Review all documents thoroughly. Survivors should never sign a blank form for some

one else to complete later. They should always review the completed form before signing and retain a copy of the completed form for their records.

For protection against identity theft scams, notify the major credit bureaus (Equifax, Experian and TransUnion) to update the individual's credit report with a deceased notice and notify the Veteran's financial institutions so all accounts can be closed or transferred appropriately.

According to AARP, scammers also use names published in obituaries to pretend to be long lost relatives of the deceased. When it's time to write your loved one's obituary, consider leaving out the birthdate, middle name, home address, birthplace and mother's maiden name.

For other scams predators use, visit <u>www.VA.GOV/VSAFE</u>.

VA is committed to delivering world-class care and benefits to Veterans and their dependents by providing survivors with ongoing support and assistance. Check to see if you qualify for survivor benefits, such as health care coverage, Survivors' and Dependents' Education Assistance Program, housing assistance, or even help with burial costs.

For more guidance on how to report the death of a Veteran, submitting necessary documentation and finding additional resources available, visit VA Benefits For Spouses, Dependents, Survivors, And Family Caregivers | Veterans Affairs.

To report a missing VA benefits payment, identify a discrepancy in payments, or find suspicious activity with a direct deposit account, contact VA immediately at 800-827-1000. You may also file a complaint with the Federal Trade Commission if funeral homes charge to set up funeral honors or schedule a burial with VA's National Cemetery Administration by visiting reportfraud.ftc.gov. For other scams predators use, visit <u>va.gov/vsafe</u>.

## **Burials and Memorials**

VA honors the service and sacrifice of Veterans and their family members.

## How to Apply

To find out in advance if a Veteran or family member is eligible for burial in a VA national cemetery, click "Apply for Pre-Need Burial Eligibility" to fill out and submit the application.

## Apply for Pre-Need Burial Eligibility

If pre-need eligibility has not been determined, upon the death of the Veteran or his or her spouse or dependent (also called the time of need), family members should locate the Veteran's DD-214 or other discharge papers if readily available and click "Schedule a Burial" to begin the process. Then make arrangements with a funeral home, National Cemetery Scheduling Office, or directly with a VA national cemetery.

## VA Memorial Benefits

VA takes special care to pay lasting tribute to the memory of Veterans who served and sacrificed and that of their families. VA meticulously maintains 155 VA national cemeteries in 44 states and Puerto Rico and is working to increase access to accommodate Veterans and eligible family members close to home. Currently, more than 94 percent of Veterans have a burial option in an open VA, state or tribal veterans cemetery located within 75 miles of their home.

Note that most if not all of these benefits may be provided for Veterans who are interred in a State, Territorial or Tribal Veterans cemetery. Check with the cemetery to ensure coverage. Some benefits are also available for Veterans who choose burial in a private cemetery.

Veterans with a qualifying discharge are entitled to VA burial benefits. Spouses and dependent children are eligible too, even if they predecease the Veteran.

## The following burial benefits may be provided:

## Burial in a VA national cemetery

Opening and closing of the grave for burial of casketed or cremated remains, or placement of cremated remains in an above-ground vault, also called a columbarium

A government furnished grave liner

Perpetual care of the gravesite

A headstone or marker with an inscription

A burial flag

A Presidential Memorial Certificate

A dedicated memorial page on the Veterans Legacy Memorial site where friends and family can upload photos and remembrances

Burial in a private cemetery

A government headstone, marker, or medallion

A burial flag

A Presidential Memorial Certificate

Some survivors may also be entitled to VA burial allowances as partial reimbursement for the costs of funerals and burials for eligible Veterans

Please note that gravesites in a VA national cemetery cannot be reserved in advance. To prepare for a private cemetery burial, VA suggests families review these questions and complete required forms in advance.

St. Johns County Veterans Oral History Project



Stories of Service is an oral history project focused on the veterans of St. Johns County. The goal of this project was to collect, document, and preserve the memories of local veterans for future generations.

Materials collected by the Society for this project have allowed for the creation of two exhibits, one physical at the Oldest House Museum Complex at 14 St. Francis Street on display until January, one digital, accessible below and through our main website under the LEARN tab.

## **VA SURVIVOR BENEFITS & THE PACT ACT**

#### You may be eligible for VA benefits and services after your loved one has passed.



## The PACT Act makes it easier for many survivors to receive Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC).

VA will be contacting survivors who were previously denied DIC benefits and may be newly eligible under the PACT Act. You do not need to wait for VA to contact you to submit a claim.

## How to Apply for DIC and/or Accrued Benefits

Surviving family members may apply for these benefits using the appropriate VA form on va.gov/family-member-benefits.



#### Dependency and Indemnity Compensation

Monthly payment for the eligible surviving spouse, dependent children or parent(s) of the Veteran or service member IF Veteran or service member died in the line of duty or due to a service-related injury or illness.

#### **Accrued Benefits**

A one-time payment to a surviving spouse, dependent child(ren) or dependent parent(s) of a deceased Veteran based on relationship when the record shows additional benefits (such as VA compensation or pension) due to the Veteran prior to passing.

## Additional Survivor Benefits Available:



#### **Burials and Burial Allowance**

Burial benefits available include a gravesite in any of our National cemeteries with available space, opening and closing of the grave, perpetual care, a government headstone, marker, or medallion, a burial flag, and a Presidential Memorial Certificate, at no cost. Some survivors may also be eligible for a plot allowance, transportation allowance, and burial allowances based on the service connected disability status of the deceased Veteran.



#### **Education and Training**

Chapter 35 benefits and Fry Scholarship are the two main GI Bill programs offering educational assistance to survivors and dependents of Veterans who died in the line of duty or as a result of service-related disabilities.



## Final Monthly Payment

If a Veteran who is receiving VA compensation or pension benefits passes away, their last month of benefits can be paid to their surviving spouse.



## **Home Loan Guaranty**

Certificate of Eligibility is available for surviving spouses receiving DIC.

#### Health Care

Survivors and dependents of Veterans may qualify for health care benefits, such as CHAMPVA.



## Are You eligible to file for benefits based on Presumptive Exposure?

Were you exposed to hazardous materials while serving in the military, such as from Agent Orange or burn pits? Did you serve in Vietnam, Thailand or Southwest Asia? If so, you may be eligible to file for service-connected benefits based on presumptive exposure.

Over the course of the last six months, VA has begun processing service-connected disability claims for six new presumptive conditions related to exposure to hazardous materials.

In May 2021, VA started implementing provisions of the William M. Thornberry National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2021 (NDAA), adding bladder cancer, hypothyroidism and Parkinsonism to the list of medical conditions presumptively associated with exposure to Agent Orange. A few months later, VA added asthma, rhinitis and sinusitis (to include rhinosinusitis) on a presumptive basis based on particulate matter exposures during military service in Southwest Asia and certain other areas.

Any Veteran who was previously denied service-connection for any of these six conditions but had symptoms manifest within 10 years of military service would need to file another claim. Be sure to use VA Form 20-0995, "Decision Review Request: Supplemental Claim" when filing. The claim form should include the name of the medical condition and also specify that the medical condition is being claimed due to in-service exposure to environmental hazards.

VA is committed to assisting Veterans who may have been exposed to hazardous materials during their military service.

Be sure to stay plugged in to www.va.gov for the most recent developments around environmental hazards; VA is constantly conducting research and surveillance, as well as reviewing scientific literature for conditions that may be related to exposure during military service.

If you feel you have a chronic condition attributed to an in-service exposure, we highly encourage you
