

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Fellow Veterans, The summer of 2022 is now behind us as we prepare for many activities in the veterans community this fall.

In just a few short days, the Veterans Service Office with the support of the Veterans Council will conduct the annual Homeless Veterans Stand Down at the Elks Lodge. This event will take place on Saturday, Oct. 8 at 0900. On Friday, Oct. 7, we will be setting up the Elks Lodge with tables in order to display all the clothing, DOD surplus and all the various organizations that support our veterans and provide services to homeless veterans. Volunteers are always welcome to help both days. Those wanting to volunteer on Oct. 7 should be at the Elks Lodge at 0900 and if you plan to volunteer on Oct. 8, please plan to be there by 0800. The program should last about 4 hours on Oct. 8.

The Veterans Day committee continues to meet to finalize plans for this year's Veterans Day Program to be held at Anastasia Baptist Church. We have an outstanding program lined up to honor all our veterans and this year's theme is the Global War on Terrorism. This is our nation's longest military engagement and many in our community have served during this period. Please plan to attend on Nov. 11 in order that we can honor you for your service. A flyer for the program appears in this month's newsletter giving all the details.

Our area is seeing a significant increase in the number of homeless veterans in our community. There are many reasons for this increase including the lack of affordable housing, increase in rental property costs due to inflation, cost of living increase, and transitory migration into our area just to name a few. Whatever the reason that brings about this unfortunate



circumstance for a veteran, the fact is our County does not have a housing provision for these less fortunate veterans. The Veterans Council has been housing these veterans in local motels and providing not only shelter but food gift cards to help with their nourishment needs. This is the most expensive way to provide food and shelter for our homeless veteran population. We are working with several agencies to try to obtain a more permanent solution to this problem but that has not happened yet. We continue to be hopeful this permanent solution is not too far off.

This year we especially recognize all those who donned the uniform during the "Global War On Terrorism." The shock and anger arising in millions of Americans in the aftermath of the 9/11 twin tower strikes were reminiscent of those after the Pearl Harbor attack, sixty years earlier. In both cases, a vicious war of global dimensions followed. Notably, as in all previous generations, millions of Americans left their homes to rally round the flag and shield their country from the further

danger sure to follow. The 20th century WWII ended relatively quickly. 

Chairman Bill Dudley of the Veterans Council of St. Johns County has announced the annual drive for Wreaths Across America has begun.



Just released, more to follow next month

Florida Department of Veterans Affairs Executive Director James S. Hartsell told the Cabinet Tuesday 40 applications were submitted to the Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame Council for consideration



this year. The Council vetted the applications and submitted to Hartsell the names of 10 veterans selected for induction into the hall this year.

"They have my full support," Hartsell said as he announced the 2022 slate of inductees.

Included in the 2022 class are three veterans from Tampa and two from Tallahassee. They are Jeffery Cathey, Greg Holder and Maxine Reyes of Tampa; and Gordon Lightfoot and Glenn Sutphin of Tallahassee.

Other veteran inductees include Palm Harbor resident Mike Bousher; Jacksonville resident Anthony D'Aleo; Orlando resident John Gionet; Riviera Beach resident Don Lanman; and St. Augustine resident John Leslie.

The Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame Wall is on the Plaza Level of the Florida Capitol in Tallahassee. The Legislature created the Hall of Fame in 2012 as a way to honor the accomplishments of the 1.5 million veterans who live here.

Unlike a traditional military Hall of Fame, the Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame recognizes veterans for their civic, business and community accomplishments. Only veterans who have been discharged honorably can be considered for induction. The law allows for as many as 20 veterans to be named to the Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame each year.

Veterans, or those acting on their behalf, can submit applications between January 1 and May 31. The ceremony occurs on or near Veteran's Day, November 11. Including the inductees from the 2022 class 131 veterans are in the Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame.

MINUTES OF GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING



TREASURER'S REPORT: Treasurer John Mountcastle provided a detailed report that as of July 28, 2022, there was a balance of \$108,808.71 and as of August 24, 2022, there is balance of \$103,781.74. There is a \$500 gift card donated, giving the balance amount of \$104,281.74. There is an outstanding credit card balance of \$1,120.50. The credit card gets a lot of use helping our Veterans that may need lodging. The Treasure went over the majority of the expenses and what they covered. The Treasurer's Report was approved by voice vote with no changes.

INTRODUCTION OF GUESTS: Chairman Dudley

There were numerous new attendees at this month's meeting that introduced themselves, including members that not been in attendance in a while.

PRESENTATIONS:

SPECIAL GUEST, Mr. Ed Trester, recipient of the Gold Medal in May 2022. Presentation was given in June locally here in St. Johns County. Mr. Trester, age of 96, spoke of the recognition and his time in the Merchant Marines during WWII. Mr. Trester left a flyer he made about information of the Merchant Marines and their duties during WWII.



SPEAKERS:

CARMALITA GAINES, JACKSONVILLE VET CENTER

Ms. Gaines gave her military background and talked of her service in the US Air Force. She then spoke of the programs and assistance the Vet Center Program offers to our Veterans. The Vet Center Program is a special program within the VA that offers a lot of counseling for Veterans and has nationally been in service since 1979; the local area of Jacksonville, opened in 1980. The Vet Center was opened as a place for Veterans, especially Vietnam Veterans, to have a "safe place" to talk and receive counseling for what they had experienced both in war and returning home to a society that was less than accepting. It gave them a place, other than medical, to express their feelings and talk with other Veterans that were experiencing the same thing. The Vet Center Program's main purpose is to help Veterans deal with and get help with the trauma they have experienced. The therapists and counselors are licensed, and all discussions are confidential. Ms. Gaines provided a flyer with information about the Vet Center Program.

KATHY CHURCH, FL COORDINATOR, MISSING IN AMERICA PROJECT

The Missing In America Project is a non-profit, nationwide, 501(3)c organization whose goal is to locate, identify and interment of the unclaimed cremated remains of Veterans, spouses and dependents that have sat in many areas and not placed in cemeteries, memorials, etc., where they should have been. The Missing In America Project is the only organization that has permission from the VA to go to funeral homes and other places to locate these unclaimed cremated remains. They then identify that the cremains are eligible for placement in a National Cemetery. Once about 25 cremains are located and eligible for burial here in Florida, they prepare a full military service with honors at one of the 9 Florida National Cemeteries. The Program is operated by volunteers and there is a need for more volunteers to help with this program and its accomplishments.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

VETERANS SERVICE OFFICER UPDATE, JOSEPH MCDERMOTT

Mr. McDermott mentioned the upcoming Veterans Homeless Standdown that will be held on October 8, 2022, at 9:00 am at the Elks Lodge. Set up will be on Friday, October 7, 2022, at 8:00 am for volunteers that would like to help.

The Veterans Service Office has made a flyer that details the PACT ACT. Please pick one up if you need help to simplify the need for assistance in dealing with the 20+ presumptive for burn pit and toxins exposure have been added for Gulf War and Post 9/11 Veterans. The flyer tries to make it as simple as possible to assist those Veterans in need to file claims. It also breaks down the Agent Orange presumptive. Hypertension has been added as a presumptive and a blood disease MGUS (bone marrow, blood protein). Also, the locations that are recognized for the presumptive. Some of the past denied claims can be looked at to see if the Veteran, or deceased Veteran, now qualifies.

VETERANS TREATMENT COURT, JOHN LESLIE

Mr. Leslie introduced himself to new attendees and explained the Veterans Treatment Court and its function. A mentor is assigned to each veteran that goes through this course to assist with navigation of this course. The Treatment Court is looking for new, younger mentors to help assist. The Treatment Court is in its sixth year and during those years have inducted 109 veterans into the court. Sixty-one have graduated. There are thirty-five veterans inflow at this time. Thirteen left the program without graduating (one suicide). There was a graduation of three at the last session. Next court session is August 26th at 10:00am with an open invitation to anyone that wishes to attend and observe.

NEW BUSINESS:

Jerry Hanchett represented Ray Quinn for "Wreaths Across America" to place wreaths on the graves of our Veterans in the oldest National Cemetery in America here in St. Augustine. A handout was provided for donations. The price of the wreaths has not changed, \$15 per wreath, if you purchase two, the

sponsor gets an additional wreath – so that is three wreaths for \$30. We need to raise \$12,000 to get a wreath on every headstone. Saturday, December 17th is when the wreaths will be placed. Volunteers will place the wreaths at the event. Everyone and their families are invited to attend.

Chairman Dudley spoke of Veterans Day, November 11th, at 11:00 am and there will be a ceremony honoring our Veterans at the Anastasia Baptist Church. The Global War on Terror Wall and the Vietnam Veteran Wall will be there. The speaker will be Major General John Haas. Theme this year will be the Global War on Terror — which covers a 20-year period. Every Veteran that served during that time will be recognized. Each of the attending Veterans recognized that day will be presented with a lapel pin on the Global War on Terror as part of honoring them.

Chairman Dudley discussed the Continuum of Care Program that the Veterans Council and the Veterans Service Office is part of and teaming with Flagler Health. The main goal of Continuum of Care currently is to find housing for our homeless veterans. The Program is attempting to house 9 Veterans before the end of the year. Looking for ten volunteers to help gather the needed information to assist the Case Managers in placing the Veterans.

Chairman Dudley reported that he spoke with Dr. McKinsey at the CBOC about having a "dedication" for the Clinic that had to be postponed due to the pandemic. Currently looking at a date in November for the dedication to be held. A time and date will be given at the next meeting.

Meeting adjourned at 8:30 pm.

teers-in-Parks (VIPs) perform a wide range of tasks, such as demonstrating historic weapons, giving interpretive programs, answering questions, assisting with safety, and generally helping visitors get the most out of their experience. Find Your Park, join our VIP corps, and help bring the Castillo to life!

We're looking for outgoing individuals who love talking to people and can commit at least 4 hours a week to the Castillo. Schedules are flexible, and there are many ways that you can help connect visitors to our park. Love teaching but hate being stuck indoors? National Parks are some of the country's best open-air classrooms, and there are so many amazing stories to share with the people who come through our gates. Visitors come from around the world to see our historic city, and there's never a dull day at the Castillo de San Marcos.

Always wanted to fire the cannons and muskets on the weekends? Our historic weapons crews are primarily VIPs, and no experience is necessary; we provide extensive on-the-job training. We also have a cache of reproduction historic uniforms that VIPs can borrow while at the park, so there's no need for an expensive investment in a kit. Please feel free to contact me with any questions and share this email with anyone of interest: GratitudeAmerica's Military Support Retreat is a program offered at no-cost for military members to attend along with their primary support person (spouse, partner, friend, other adult family member) and has immediate openings for the October session that will be from Thurs, Oct 6th at 5pm through Sun, Oct 9th at 2pm in Marineland, FL (There is no cost to attend, and we provide all activities, lodging, meals. The program does not provide transportation)

Our Military Support Retreat program is a 3 night retreat program that has 2 focuses - 1 part of the program is focused on education through large and small group

discussions led by mental health clinicians and military peer mentors and the 2nd focus is on Nature-based recreational activities focused on providing an opportunity for bonding, fun, and/or relaxation.

Additionally, the Military Support Retreats provides:

A supportive environment in which Veterans AND their support person can connect with their peers, gain critical coping skills, and other tools and techniques.

Many outdoor activities centered around nature-based recreation.

Large and small group discussions led by expert facilitators about concepts of post-traumatic growth.

Opportunity for participants to learn from themselves and their own experiences - not just learning from others.

Therapeutic approaches, not "therapy"

This program is available for any member of the military who deployed to combat anytime during service and open to all duty statuses (active, retired, etc) and all branches.

Program is for adults only, no children and the service member cannot attend alone as the program is uniquely designed to support the service member and their primary support person who is attending with them

The Royal Air Force in Florida By Rick Cain

"Never in the field of human conflict was so much owed by so many to so few."

This famous line was spoken by then British Prime Minister Winston Churchill to the British Parliament on August 20, 1940, in the midst of a desperate struggle between the British Royal Air Force (RAF) and the German Luftwaffe (Air Force). What has come to be known as "the Battle of Britain" is remembered each September 15th for a battle that was on-going for three months and three weeks in the skies over England.

The forces of Nazi Germany had taken control of Belgium, the Netherlands, Denmark, and Norway by May of 1940; France fell the following month. The only thing protecting England from invasion was water. The English Channel and the North Sea, two formidable barriers known for foul seas, still remained under the firm control of the British Navy. Germany's only option to prepare the way for invasion was to soften up British defenses along the southern coast by way of aerial bombardment. It was up to the RAF to defend the homeland from those massive formations of bombers coming across the water. The Spitfire fighter pilots flew day after day, week after week, short on sleep to the point of exhaustion, and short of personnel, to stop the German invasion. This was war in the skies on a grand scale, and in the end, the men and women of the RAF prevailed.

It was also during this time that radar systems were being fine-tuned so that incoming flights could be identified for their relative position and distance away from the English coast. Unknown to the German command, the German Enigma Code was also broken, and Churchill, with his command staff, could decode German orders and battle plans. He then could send his own coded messages, nicknamed "Ultra," to the RAF and naval command to launch preemptive bombing strikes against German naval invasion preparations on the coast of France. The German losses as a result of these efforts meant that the German Luftwaffe cut back to only performing nighttime bombing missions over the English homeland, particularly London, a period now referred to as "The Blitz," which continued through May of 1941. "Blitz" is short for the German word "Blitzkrieg," meaning "Lightning War." The British people held fast and survived, though serious damage was done across the nation. Nine American pilots joined the RAF as volunteers to fly in the Battle of Britain before America formally entered the war. These

men were allowed to maintain their American citizenship during their service in the RAF.

Though England was successful in fending off an invasion, the Battle of Britain left the RAF very short of pilots. With virtually no calm airspace in which to train their incoming personnel, the RAF looked to America to help them in their time of need, or face being crushed eventually by the superior forces of Nazi Germany.

America had already been sending aid to Britain through Roosevelt's Lend-Lease Act of 1941. The RAF requested permission to train pilots at our existing Army Air Fields, but though we were not yet formally at war, these fields were already full of our own pilots. As a compromise, Roosevelt allowed the RAF to use two former WWI air fields in Florida: one in Arcadia and one in Clewiston.

Carlstrom Field in Arcadia had been abandoned for fifteen years when it was sold to John Riddle (of Embry-Riddle fame) for \$500.00. Here, he began training British pilots in Spring 1941, later acquiring the second airfield in Clewiston for the same purpose.

Due to America's formal neutrality at the time, British cadets entered the United States from Canada (part of the British Commonwealth), and then traveled by train to Florida. They were issued both RAF uniforms and civilian suits; since they had to enter the United States as civilians, they would not put on uniforms until arriving at the training base.

Riddle, a civilian pilot, began training in Arcadia, calling the air field No. 5 British Flying Training School (No. 5 BFTS). After the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, most of the RAF fliers changed locations and were trained at Clewiston when American cadets began to train at Arcadia. Some American cadets training with American instructors went on to take more extensive training with British instructors. They reported that the British instruction was more intense with heavier emphasis on night flying and solo flying with navigation. A few even received both their U.S. Army Air Corps wings and RAF wings upon graduation.

For the British who spent time here, Florida was a paradise after growing up in typical wet and cold English and Scottish weather. They wrote letters home of the glorious sunshine, warm weather, fresh fruit, especially Florida oranges, clear skies, and vast expanses of undeveloped land that was perfect for flight training. The bases boasted a pool and excellent training facilities and quarters for the cadets.

Following the war, the two training fields became public airports. Of the 1,500 men who trained there, not all of them made it home to Britain. Some 25 fliers lost their lives in training accidents, never leaving the United States. There is a British section in the Oak Ridge Cemetery in Arcadia with a marker commemorating their sacrifice to the war effort. A Union Jack flag flys there as well. The Clewiston airport terminal flies the Union Jack alongside the American flag and the State of Florida flag to commemorate when the war brought the RAF to Florida.





Following military veteran's death, his family gets new roof on Arlington home

The family of Victor Hunt, who died in July, is getting a new roof from Tadlock Roofing. (Copyright 2022 by WJXT News4Jax - All rights reserved.)

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. – The family of a local military veteran who recently died is getting a new roof on their Arlington home.

The Hunt family lost their husband and father, Victor Hunt, in July.

His loved ones — including his son, Lucas, who has special needs — were left living in a home with a roof that was leaking and desperately needed to be replaced, but they couldn't afford to pay the deductible for their insurance.

The family of a local military veteran who recently died is getting a new roof on their Arlington home.

A sales representative from Tadlock Roofing met the family through day-to-day roofing business, and after hearing about their plight, the company's management decided to provide the family with a roof — free of charge — as part of its effort to help those in need.

"I started crying, and I told my husband, guess what? That's one less stress I have to worry about. I just inherited the home and I have no clue how to start from one side of the house to the other," said Mollie Hunt, Victor Hunt's daughter. "I

was so thankful. I was crying."

The family said Lucas Hunt was faced with having to live in a group home because of the conditions resulting from the leaky roof, but now that the roof is fixed, he will be able to stay at home with them.















'An amazing feeling': Phoenix veteran is first in Arizona to walk with robotic exoskeleton

Richie Neider, a U.S. Army veteran from Phoenix, is the first Arizona veteran who is taking home a robotic exoskeleton that will help him walk independently again.

Neider was serving in Operation Iraqi Freedom in 2005 when he received a spinal cord injury that left him unable to walk. For nearly a decade, he has been in a wheelchair, but will now have the opportunity to stand and walk on his own with the help of his new ReWalk Personal 6.0 Exoskeleton, fully funded by Veterans Affairs through a national program.

"It feels like walking," Neider said. "Even though I know my legs aren't actually doing it, I'm doing it, so it just an amazing feeling."

The device is a battery-powered, motorized system that helps individuals with spinal cord injuries or other disabilities walk again. Motors at the hip and knee joints move the legs whenever the device senses a change in the person's center of gravity.

It takes 28 sessions over about 2.5 months for a patient to be trained to use the exoskeleton, according to Dan Bonaroti, a physical therapist and owner of Touchstone Rehabilitation, where Neider trained. Touchstone is the only location in Arizona currently training individuals to use the technology.

"It's super exciting for our vets to be able to have another option to literally be able to get up and walk," Bonaroti said.

The ReWalk device was approved for commercial use by the federal government in 2014. As it is a relatively new technology, each unit can go for upwards of \$75,000.

But a national VA program, started in 2015, has helped fully offset the cost of a unit and training for many veterans, including Neider.

About 30 veterans have received a ReWalk exoskeleton through the VA program, according to Matt Fuller, ReWalk's business development manager for the southwest U.S. region.

The process for receiving a unit through the VA starts with an evaluation on whether an individual

meets certain criteria for using the device — including whether their body is fit — before they are given a short trial

Fuller said Neider contacted ReWalk in the summer of 2021 to begin the process of procuring an exoskeleton. It took Neider around six to eight conversations with the VA to get his trial approved by May 2022.



Neider said he never believed he would be able to walk again, and even after learning about the ReWalk device, he felt skeptical, but said he is glad that he was wrong.

"It'll be used every day," Neider said with a laugh.

Neider used a wheelchair for nearly a decade before receiving the exoskeleton. At first, he said, being in the wheelchair made him depressed and angry, saying he often felt like yelling at people who were able to walk because it felt unfair.

It was Neider's wife who inspired him to find ways to overcome this depression, he said.

"What I found out through all of it was the biggest disability is not my inability to walk, but it was the way I was looking at things, it was the mental side of it," Neider said.

Neider has a newfound appreciation for his ability to ride motorcycles, which he has loved to do since he was seven years old.

Since getting back on his bike, Neider said he's joined a group of combat veterans who enjoy riding motorcycles together and traveling annually to the Sturgis Motorcycle Rally in Sturgis, South Dakota.

Neider said he will be taking his ReWalk device with him next year to the rally.

"I'll have legs and be able to walk with everybody instead of rolling with everybody," he said.

Walking with his buddies at motorcycle events is one of the things Neider said he was most excited to do with his ReWalk exoskeleton. He also said he was looking forward to simply being able to walk around the neighborhood with his wife.

"There's no words to actually describe it," Neider said. "Normal is, I guess, a good word, like you're like everybody else. And that's all we ever want, is to be with everybody else."

First, a little history: During the 35-day shutdown between December 2018 and January 2019, the U.S. Coast Guard continued to work without compensation, providing vital services which safeguarded our nation's coastline and waterways. The Veterans' Council of St. Johns County, Inc. contributed \$500, and, by working with the USO at Mayport and local Navy League Chapters, worked to provide other emergency aid to local Coast Guard members.

This bill, introduced into the US Senate (S. 4802) on Sept. 8, includes a sorely-needed provision (§256) to ensure members of the U.S. Coast Guard continue to receive pay and allowances during a government shutdown. While members serving under the Department of Defense already have this benefit, the Coast Guard is under the Department of Homeland Security and, until this pending legislation, does not enjoy the same protection of the benefits to which they would otherwise be entitled.

This bill, which covers the service's funding through Fiscal Year 2023 (starting Oct. 1), also includes improvements for Coast Guard families which are critical for retention.

The Veterans' Council of St. Johns County, Inc. advocates providing Coast Guard military personnel with the same benefits and emoluments enjoyed by those serving in the military services under the Department of Defense. Educating our elected officials about existing inequities, such as discussed above, and encouraging their support of the Coast Guard Authorization Act of 2022, perhaps the Coast Guard military personnel will be treated as their Department of Defense counterparts.

The Veterans' Council of St. Johns County, Inc., as a public charity, (recognized under IRS §501(c)(3)), is prohibited from directly or indirectly participating in, or intervening in, any political campaign on behalf of (or in opposition to) any candidate for elective office, However, public charities are permitted to conduct some lobbying (i.e., attempting to influence legislation) such as urging the public to contact members or employees of a legislative body for the purpose of supporting or opposing such legislation, provided r such activities are "not substantial" based upon level of effort and expenditures.



VA SURVIVOR BENEFITS & THE PACT ACT

ESGR4U

You may be eligible for VA benefits and services after your loved one has passed.



The PACT Act makes it easier for many survivors to receive Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC).

VA will be contacting survivors who were previously denied DIC benefits and may be newly eligible under the PACT Act. You do not need to wait for VA to contact you to submit a claim.

How to Apply for DIC and/or Accrued Benefits

Surviving family members may apply for these benefits using the appropriate VA form on va.gov/family-member-benefits.



Dependency and Indemnity Compensation

Monthly payment for the eligible surviving spouse, dependent children or parent(s) of the Veteran or service member IF Veteran or service member died in the line of duty or due to a service-related injury or illness.



Accrued Benefits

A one-time payment to a surviving spouse, dependent child(ren) or dependent parent(s) of a deceased Veteran based on relationship when the record shows additional benefits (such as VA compensation or pension) due to the Veteran prior to passing.

Additional Survivor Benefits Available:



Burials and Burial Allowance

Burial benefits available include a gravesite in any of our National cemeteries with available space, opening and closing of the grave, perpetual care, a government headstone, marker, or medallion, a burial flag, and a Presidential Memorial Certificate, at no cost. Some survivors may also be eligible for a plot allowance, transportation allowance, and burial allowances based on the service connected disability status of the deceased Veteran.



Final Monthly Payment

If a Veteran who is receiving VA compensation or pension benefits passes away, their last month of benefits can be paid to their surviving spouse.



Home Loan Guaranty

Certificate of Eligibility is available for surviving spouses receiving DIC.



Health Care

Survivors and dependents of Veterans may qualify for health care benefits, such as CHAMPVA.



Education and Training

Chapter 35 benefits and Fry Scholarship are the two main GI Bill programs offering educational assistance to survivors and dependents of Veterans who died in the line of duty or as a result of service-related disabilities.







- Your record will be returned to you immediately.

Recording your DD-214 maintains a permanent digital copy on file for safekeeping. Your record is **protected** – it doesn't become a public record for 62 years after separation, per the National Archives

Can't make it on Nov. 11? Record your discharge papers at the St. Johns County Courthouse, 4010 Lewis Speedway, St. Augustine. Call the Recording division at 904-819-3632 for details.

Do you have your DD-214? That is the first question Veterans are asked when engaging in almost every benefits or Veteran-status related process. Often, it is the first question Veteran widows and widowers are asked after hearing "I'm sorry for your loss."

Each of Florida's county Clerk of Courts knows how valuable it is having a copy of your DD-214 safely and privately stored, with easy access. Click and read how you can record your DD-214 for free, year-round, regardless of what county you live in.

Are You eligible to file for benefits based on Presumptive Exposure?

Were you exposed to hazardous materials while serving in the military, such as from Agent Orange or burn pits? Did you serve in Vietnam, Thailand or Southwest Asia? If so, you may be eligible to file for service-connected benefits based on presumptive exposure.

Over the course of the last six months, VA has begun processing service-connected disability claims for six new presumptive conditions related to exposure to hazardous materials.

In May 2021, VA started implementing provisions of the William M. Thornberry National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2021 (NDAA), adding bladder cancer, hypothyroidism and Parkinsonism to the list of medical conditions presumptively associated with exposure to Agent Orange. A few months later, VA added asthma, rhinitis and sinusitis (to include rhinosinusitis) on a presumptive basis based on particulate matter exposures during military service in Southwest Asia and certain other areas.

Any Veteran who was previously denied service-connection for any of these six conditions but had symptoms manifest within 10 years of military service would need to file another claim. Be sure to use VA Form 20-0995, "Decision Review Request: Supplemental Claim" when filing. The claim form should include the name of the medical condition and also specify that the medical condition is being claimed due to in-service exposure to environmental hazards.


VA is committed to assisting Veterans who may have been exposed to hazardous materials during their military service.

Be sure to stay plugged in to www.va.gov for the most recent developments around environmental hazards; VA is constantly conducting research and surveillance, as well as reviewing scientific literature for conditions that may be related to exposure during military service.

If you feel you have a chronic condition attributed to an in-service exposure, we highly encourage you






