The Veterans Council has launched our 2023 Wreaths Across America program for this year. Wreaths are now on sale and can be purchased by filling out the WAA sponsorship form and mailing it to our PO Box 2117, St. Augustine, Fl. 32085 along with a check made out to Wreaths Across America. The price of a wreath has increased slightly this year from \$15 to \$17. If you purchase two wreaths you still will receive three. The order form appears in this edition of The Patriot Reader or by contacting Jerry Hanchett, WAA Committee Chairman at 904-347-8293 or me at 904-806-4712. The WAA wreath laying ceremony will take place this year on Dec.16, 2023 at the St. Augustine National Cemetery. The program will begin at 12 noon. Volunteers will be needed to help unload the truck at 10 AM. Our guest speaker for this year's ceremony will be Sheriff Rob Hardwick.

Recently, the Jacksonville National Cemetery Support Committee announced the need to purchase a new golf cart for the Jacksonville Ladies. These ladies accompany the families of every veteran that is interred at JNC. A golf cart is the only means they have of moving between interment sites. Burials are scheduled approximately every 30 minutes during the day. The cost of a new golf cart to replace the old one is approximately \$12,000. The Support Committee has raised nearly \$8000. Our Council donated \$4500 this week in order to meet the goal and place an order for the golf cart. Be sure to put Friday, Dec. 8, 2023 on your calendar. That evening, World renowned Global Walk, Inc. will host the World Changers Concert at the St. Augustine Amphitheater featuring The Long Run / Eagles Tribute Band. Tickets are now on sale at the Amphitheater box office or online at www.theamp.com. Also, the guest speaker will be Karen Vaugh, a Gold Star mother and author of the bestseller book, World Changer, the story of her son, Navy Seal Aaron Vaughan who was killed in ac-



tion in the Tangi River Valley in Afghanistan on Aug. 6, 2011 when a Chinook helicopter with 29 other service members, was shot down from the sky while rushing into battle. All perished. You don't want to miss this concert and some of the proceeds will go to help homeless veterans in our area. If you haven't put Nov.11 on your calendar, now is the time to do it. We have an excellent Veterans Day Program lined up to be presented at Anastasia Baptist Church with our featured speaker for this year's program, The Adjutant General of the State of Florida, Maj. General John Haas. The theme for this year's program is The Global War on Terrorism. I look forward to seeing you there.

The Veterans Day Ceremony will start promptly at 11:00 am.



This year we especially recognize all those who donned the uniform during the "Global War On Terrorism." The shock and anger arising in millions of Americans in the aftermath of the 9/11 twin tower strikes were reminiscent of those after the Pearl Harbor attack, sixty years earlier. In both cases, a vicious war of global dimensions followed. Notably, as in all previous generations, millions of Americans left their homes to rally round the flag and shield their country from the further

danger sure to follow. The 20th century WWII ended relatively quickly. The 21st century war on terrorism stretched over two decades, yet we note with special pride that the millions of American women and men who participated in it were all volunteers, including hundreds of thousands from Florida. Here, the 53rd Infantry Brigade Combat Team has just completed training at Ft. Hood Texas in early 2010 before deploying 7,000 miles east for combat duty in Iraq.



While the anti-terror mission continues in far flung crisis areas around the globe, with this year's withdrawal of troops from Afghanistan major combat forces have returned once more to their homeland. National POW/MIA Recognition Day

In the United States, National POW/MIA Recognition Day is observed on the third Friday in September. It honors those who were prisoners of war and those who are still missing in action. It is most associated with those who were POWs during the Vietnam War.

The Veterans Council of St Johns County recognizing the many hardships, bravery and sacrifices of our POWs produced the documentary "Prisoners of War: Stolen Freedom", which has been broadcast on PBS.

This documentary features the heroic stories of 4 of our local veterans.

Prisoners of War: Stolen Freedom

"Prisoners of War: Stolen Freedom" compares the stories of four American servicemen through their time as prisoners of war in three major 20th century conflicts; World War II, Korea and the Vietnam war. Their stories are supported by archival motion pictures and photographs obtained at the US National Archives as well as through sketches and memorabilia collected by each of the men. Their stories are less about atrocity than they are about the survival of the human spirit and the camaraderie that helped each man survive years of incarceration. Each story is followed by spectacular recounts of their days of release. Produced by Michael Rothfeld, Bill Dudley and the Veterans Council of St. Johns County, directed by Eric Flagg"








Stories of Service: Paddleboarding with Wounded Warrior Project

Wounded Warrior Project gave local veterans the opportunity to clear their minds and enjoy an afternoon of paddleboarding in Fernandina Beach.

FERNANDINA BEACH, Fla. — First Coast News is proud to share the Stories of Service of the brave men and women who wear the uniforms of our armed forces. And we're also proud to showcase the great opportunities available to those service members when they come home from the service.



Wounded Warrior Project is a national non-profit charity that supports veterans and active duty service members in a variety of ways from counseling, job placement and, for at least one day, paddleboarding.

"It's one of those days that you're able to get out of bed and feel alive, you get to go in the water and feel the ocean breeze, the wind and water, you can smell it and enjoy everything about it," said one Warrior who took part in the paddleboarding event. Wounded Warrior Project helped coordinate the event for more than a dozen veterans to paddle from Fernandina Beach to the Cumberland Island National Seashore. "We'll get ready to launch here in about 15-20 minutes, time for the tide to change on us but we do have the wind at our back," said one of the paddleboarding instructors.

"We're today going out on paddleboarding with Jeff from Latitude 29," said one of the Warriors, "it's one of those things that gives you peace and calm and helps you with your mindset."

Peace and calm is not easily achieved by many veterans who return from active duty.

"In 2012 I did try to commit suicide," said one of the Warriors, "depression, PTSD, everything along those lines, but Wounded Warrior Project, I keep coming back because it's a foundation where other veterans come around and just be, no questions of what's wrong with you, just enjoy one another's company."

Another step closer to calm with every stroke of the paddle. "From 2006 when I was injured in Iraq Wounded Warrior Project has been there for me since day 1 and any event that I can support, I'll be there," said one of the Warriors.

Wounded Warrior Project is celebrating its 20th anniversary of serving veterans and their families. They're also based in Jacksonville and more information about programs that they offer can be found on their website.



Update on Veteran homeless in St Johns County

The count of Veteran's without housing at the time of last year's stand down was approximately 38 Veterans. Out of the 38 Veterans, only about 9 showed up for the stand down last year. The reason for the low turn out then is because those 38 Veterans were all engaged in case management services and working on housing placements. A majority of those Veterans at that time were able be placed in hotel rooms while waiting on housing assistance due to special funding that came through because of Covid. This accounted for the low turn out at the stand down.

San Marcos Heights, an income-based apartment complex, opened up shortly after the stand down and we were able to place 13 Veterans without housing there. In January of 2023, the VA conducted a count of our homeless Veteran population and at that time there were 24. These 24 Veterans were all engaged with case management services to assist them in getting into permanent housing.

As of this date, we have approximately 12 homeless veterans that are all working with case managers for housing assistance. We have another income-based apartment complex opening up currently, Victoria's Crossing, and we have 10 units that are set aside for Veteran's preference there. St Johns Housing Partnership is opening Patriot Place soon and we are working on completing applications for Veteran's to be housed there now. We will be able to house 6 Veterans at Patriot Place.

The VA and community partners are making great strides in efforts to reach our homeless Veterans in St Johns County. These include VA has outreach workers that begin the process of approval for Hud VASH and other appropriate housing opportunities, Changing Homelessness, The Veteran's Service Office, Home Again and The Society of St Augustine Street Outreach Team who seeks out homeless Veterans and connects them to needed resources. These Veterans are connected tohealth, counseling and other resources while working on housing goals.

Because of the amazing work that is being done to reach out to our homeless Veterans, they are being connected to resources more quickly at this time. Community agencies are working tirelessly to help end the homeless situation in St Johns County and expect to be at functional zero by December of this year which means 3 or less homeless Veterans identified in St Johns County.

Since the need for a Veteran Stand Down is very low at this time, the Veteran's service office will continue to have military surplus on hand at the VSO as well as a well-stocked food pantry for those that are in need. Our Veteran Homeless Coordinator assists with connecting Veterans to housing and other resources as needed and is able to deliver supplies to them or will work with other VA and Changing Homelessness case managers to ensure they have clothing, shoes, bicycles, food, hygiene items and other surplus while they work on being qualified for housing assistance.

There are other plans in place currently for a Day Center that will provide homeless with laundry and shower facilities. This facility will also provide a place for case managers to meet with the homeless and provide resources to them. There are other projects and plans being discussed and that will assist our homeless population even more in the near future.

We are grateful for the amazing support from our wonderful volunteers who donate food to our pantry, refurbished bicycles, gas and food gift cards and other items that meet the immediate needs of our brothers and sisters. Thank you for your support! **Room 7** had the first organized church service to be held in the prisons of North Vietnam. Permission was asked for by Stockdale, and twice denied by the Camp Commander. The room was warned not to do it.

Room 7 decided to do it anyway.

Ringleaders, Risner, Coker and Rutledge were led out of the room with guards at each arm (they were headed for more Heartbreak Hotel, solitary confinement and lots of punishment).

Bud Day was the one who then jumped up on his bed and started to sing "The National Anthem".

Robbie later recalled his thoughts as his roommates burst out in song, "I felt like I was nine feet tall and could go bear hunting with a switch."

This Is How 'RED Friday' Became a Thing and Why It Still Matters Today

It's a tiny act that means much more than people seem to realize. On Fridays, civilians back home wear an article of red clothing — a shirt, a tie, anything — as a reminder to all to Remember Everyone Deployed. These Fridays became known as R.E.D. Friday.

Today, you'll see this tradition honored by most AAFES workers, military family members, and supporters of the troops, but it actually got its start about a dozen years ago. Let's talk about how this patriotic way of showing your support for the troops that are in harm's way got started and why it's an important movement.

If every one of our members shares this with other acquaintances, fellow workers, friends, and neighbors, I guarantee that it will not be long before the USA will be covered in RED — and make our troops know there are many people thinking of their well-being. You will feel better all day Friday when you wear RED!

Now, there's no telling if this chain email tactic is really what got people wearing red on Fridays, but if it was, it has to be one of the only times that people actually read one of those chain emails.

For once, we're lucky that forwards from grandma don't get filtered directly into spam...

In March, 2006, another more-tangible movement began in Canada that implored subscribers to wear red to support the troops who are deployed. Now, there's no telling if this movement got its start from the previouslymentioned email chain, but they do credit it as being an "American initiative."

Military spouses Lisa Miller and Karen Boier organized an event and rallied

many of their fellow Canadians to show up wearing red. While the "RED" is the color that fits the acronym, it also happens to work perfectly with the Canadian flag.

These events gathered steam and grew continuously until, eventually, its reach extended all the way up to the Canadian Prime Minister, Stephen Harper. On Sept 23rd, 2006, Harper led a rally of thousands in a show of solidarity for the Canadian soldiers deployed to Afghanistan as part of the Global War on Terrorism.

RED Fridays seem to wax and wane in terms of popularity among civilians, but the core of the movement is important: to Remember Everyone Deployed. The Global War on Terrorism is now officially older than troops eligible to enlist and serve in that same war — it's important to remember that we've still got men and women out there fighting for us.

It's not hard to show your support for the troops: Simply pick something red from your wardrobe and be ready to wear it on Friday, volunteer your time organizing care packages for troops who still need essential items, or write a deployed troop. I know from personal experience that every letter I received

was a boost to morale that I happily honored with a reply. Simple gestures go a long way.

Remember everyone deployed.



SMOKY, THE WAR DOG

Smoky was probably born in 1943. The tiny Yorkshire Terrier was found by American soldiers in an abandoned fox hole on the island of New Guinea. He weighed about 4 pounds and was 7 inches tall. He was soon sold to Corporal William Wynne for \$6. They became fast friends. Wynne



was an airman. He slept on a blanket in Wynne's tent. Wynne shared his rations with the little dog. He went on 12 reconnaissance and rescue missions. He survived 150 air raids and a typhoon on Okinawa. He once saved Wynne's life when he warned him of a Japanese shell that ended up killing or wounding eight other men. His greatest feat was pulling a telegraph wire through a 70foot pipe. It was a tight fit and very scary, but Smoky made it through, saving a lot of time and a dangerous task for engineers.

Wynne would bring Smoky to hospitals. In one of them, his presence caused an uncommunicative PTSD patient to start talking. He also entertained groups of soldiers like a very tiny USO show. Smoky had a lot of tricks that he could do. When the war ended, he returned home to America and quickly became a national celebrity. He toured the U.S. for many years and appeared on TV doing his tricks. He also was a common sight at veterans' hospitals. One of his tricks was walking a tightrope blindfolded. He is considered to be the first therapy dog. He died in 1957. In 2022, he was awarded the Animals in War and Peace Distinguished Service Medal. He was the first dog to receive the newly created medal to honor valorous animals.



Camp Lejeune Water Victims Offered Quicker Payout Option by Navy and Justice Department

Some veterans and family members sickened during the decades of contaminated drinking water at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina, will be able to choose to take a standard payout from the government if they want their claims



resolved faster, the Navy and Justice Department announced Wednesday.

Under the so-called "elective option" unveiled Wednesday, claimants can get between \$100,000 and \$550,000, depending on their diagnosis and how long they were exposed to the toxic water.

Officials said they hope the new option will speed up processing for the tens of thousands of claims that have been filed since last year and more quickly give closure to veterans and others.

"The elective option is a critical step in bringing relief to qualifying claimants impacted by the contaminated water at Camp Lejeune, who will now have an avenue for receiving quick and early resolution of claims under the Camp Lejeune Justice Act," Associate Attorney General Vanita Gupta said in a news release Wednesday.

The Camp Lejeune Justice Act, which was passed last year as part of the sweeping PACT Act, created a pathway for former Marines, sailors and families poisoned by contaminated drinking water at the military base to sue and recover damages. Those harmed by the water can file an administrative claim with the Navy, and if the service denies the claim or takes longer than six months to respond, they can then sue in the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of North Carolina.

More than 93,000 administrative claims have been filed since the law was enacted, a

number that is expected to grow until the Aug. 10, 2024, deadline to file a claim, officials said Wednesday. Another 1,100 lawsuits have already been filed.

To qualify for the new elective option, claimants must have specific illnesses that have been previously linked to the chemicals at Camp Lejeune and been exposed to the water for a specific amount of time.

Those diagnosed with kidney cancer, liver cancer, non-Hodgkin lymphoma, leukemia and bladder cancer could receive settlements of \$450,000 if they were exposed for more than five years; \$300,000 if they were exposed between one year and five years; or \$150,000 if they were exposed between 30 and 364 days.

Those suffering from multiple myeloma, Parkinson's disease, kidney disease (end stage renal disease) or systemic sclerosis/systemic scleroderma would get settlement offers of \$400,000 for exposures of more than than five years; \$250,000 for between one years and five years of exposure; or \$100,000 for exposures between 30 and 364 days.

Claims involving death would get another \$100,000, according to the news release.

Officials will reach out to anyone who has already filed a claim who is eligible, the release adds. Once a settlement is offered, claimants have 60 days to accept or deny it, and if they accept it, they can expect to get paid within 60 days, according to Navy guidance. Claimants who deny the offer can still pursue their administrative claim or file a lawsuit, according to the guidance.

Those who don't qualify for the elective option can still file an administrative claim or sue, it adds.

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





STATUS OF THE POW/MIA ISSUE: August 26, 2023

1,578 Americans are now listed by the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA) as missing and unaccountedfor from the Vietnam War: Vietnam - 1,238; Laos-285; Cambodia-48; Peoples Republic of China territorial waters-7. On March 23rd, DPAA posted the accounting for two USAF officers, listed MIA in Vietnam on April 12, 1969. Their identities - Colonel Ernest DeSoto and Captain Frederick Hall - were released on April 7, 2023.

These country numbers fluctuate due to investigations resulting in changed locations of loss. The League seeks the fullest possible accounting for those still missing and repatriation of all recoverable remains, and the highest priority is accounting for Americans last known alive. US intelligence indicates some Americans known to be in captivity in Vietnam (SRV), Laos (LPDR) and Cambodia (KOC) were not returned at the end of the war. In the absence of evidence to the contrary, the US Government should not rule out that possibility and should try to account for them as a matter of highest national priority.

Vietnam established comprehensive wartime and post-war processes to collect and retain information and remains. Thus, Vietnam's unilateral efforts still offer significant potential, especially when reinforced by December 12, 2022, pledges by H.E. Minister of Public Security To Lam to League Chairman Ann Mills-Griffiths to look into all categories raised as needing unilateral SRV efforts.

Until the pandemic halted in-country operations, Vietnam had increased unilateral provision of long-sought archival records with relevant, case-related information. This was due in part to improved working-level efforts, but also to increased bilateral relations across the board. The January 2018 League Delegation brought commitments that offered real promise for increased success. SRV officials were participating with greater seriousness and professionalism, including Unilateral Recovery Teams (URT), led by Vietnamese, some of whom are US-trained. Budget reductions interfered with planning for FY2023, and only two small Joint Field Activities (JFAs) were scheduled. With a budget plus-up, two additional JFAs were added in an effort to "increase the pace and scope of field operations," as requested by Vietnam since 2009. Due to improved military-to-military cooperation, US Navy assets participated in underwater operations, as did DPAA partner, Scripps Institute of Oceanography.

After an initially tough period, JFAs in Laos began to increase productivity. Though more difficult than elsewhere, Laos is now authorizing an increased number of US personnel in-country for JFAs, allowing ground transportation to accessible field sites, and contracting an SRV drone company to provide smaller scale, more capable technology to pursue case-related investigations, recently resulting in trilateral US-LPDR-SRV operations. A Lao/Cambodian border dispute impeded field operations there but now, with no DPAA detachment in **Cambodia**, Stony Beachled/private partner operations for FY 2023 resumed and are encouraging.

DIA's Stony Beach Team: One Cambodia specialist works full time at the US Embassy in Phnom Penh, and research and field operations in Cambodia have received excellent support from US Ambassador Patrick Murphy and Cambodian officials. US Ambassador to Laos, Dr. Peter Haymond, is knowledgeable and supports full use of DIA's Stony Beach (SB) specialist. Importantly, the LPDR authorized two additional Lao officials to work year-round with DIA's Stony Beach POW/MIA specialist, assigned full time in-country. Although Lao officials had approved SB field investigations outside DPAA-scheduled field operations, SB has recently been further restricted. For years, two Stony Beach personnel have rotated on temporary duty in and out of Vietnam, collecting information via archival research and interviewing witnesses. The League and DIA have long sought Vietnam's agreement to permanently station a Vietnam specialist in Hanoi, a proposal to which Vietnam finally agreed. Now, the Vietnam Office for Seeking Missing Persons (VNOSMP) has indicated that DIA's Stony Beach Vietnam specialists will be restricted to operating in the field <u>only</u> during DPAA-scheduled JFAs, an unacceptable restriction. Three Stony Beach specialists dealing with Vietnam recently participated in larger-scale field operations, but a permanent Stony Beach presence in Hanoi is still unfulfilled, due to the SRV's imposition of varied restrictions.

Comment: The greatest obstacles to increased Vietnam War accounting are 1) too few qualified US intelligence analysts; and 2) no current National Intelligence Estimate (NIE) to determine valid accounting expectations. Over 90% of unaccounted-for Vietnam War Veterans were lost in Vietnam and areas of Laos and Cambodia where SRV forces operated. Due to DPAA's refusal to request, much less conduct, an objective analysis, Executive Director Dr. Jay Veith is now finalizing the assessment to determine where the Vietnam War accounting mission stands. In view of international political and policy uncertainties, US-SRV bilateral relations are expected to grow from a comprehensive to a strategic partnership. NOW IS THE TIME FOR INCREASED RESULTS!

POW/MIA STATISTICS Statistics provided by the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA) cannot be verified!

Live Sightings: 1,996 first-hand live sighting reports have been received since 1975, none recently. 1,941 (97.24%) are resolved: 1,340 (67.13%) equated to Americans previously accounted for (i.e. returned POWs, missionaries or civilians detained for violating SRV codes); 45 (2.25%) correlated to wartime sightings of military personnel or pre-1975 sightings of civilians still unaccounted-for; 556 (27.86%) were determined to be fabrications. The remaining 55 (2.76%) unresolved first-hand reports are the focus of continuing analytical and collection efforts: 48 (2.40%) concern Americans reported in a captive environment; 7 (0.35%) are non-captive sightings. The unresolved 55 first hand sightings are listed below:

Accountability: As of today, the Department of Defense lists 1,578 Americans as missing and unaccounted-for, over 90% of them in Vietnam and in areas of Cambodia and Laos where Vietnamese forces operated during the war. According to the DPAA Lab, unilateral SRV repatriations of remains with scientific evidence of storage have accounted for less than 200 of the 730 remains from Vietnam; two were mistakenly listed as KIA/BNR in Vietnam in 1968, but remains were actually recovered at that time. All but nine of the 288 Americans accounted for in Laos since the end of the war have been the result of joint recoveries; nine were turned over by indigenous personnel to DIA Stony Beach specialists. In addition, three persons identified were recovered in Vietnam before the end of the war. There follows a breakdown by country of the <u>1,063 Americans accounted for since the official April 30</u>, <u>1975, end of the Vietnam War:</u> Vietnam, 730; Laos, 288, Cambodia, 42 and the PRC, 3. An additional 63 US personnel were accounted for between 1973 and 1975. Of the 63, 9 were from Laos, 53 from Vietnam, and 1 from Cambodia for a <u>grand total of 1,126</u>. These Americans were accounted for by unilateral US efforts in areas where access was possible, <u>not</u> post-war cooperation with Vietnam, Laos or Cambodia. Added to results from government-to-government humanitarian cooperation post-war, a total of 297 have been recovered and identified from Laos, 783 from Vietnam, 43 from Cambodia and 3 from the PRC.

VIETNAM'S ABILITY TO ACCOUNT FOR MISSING AMERICANS August 26, 2023

Family members, veteran organizations and other POW/MIA supporters throughout the country consistently opposed steps to improve economic and political relations with Vietnam until their leaders decided to cooperate fully in accounting for America's POW/MIAs. The League supported a Reagan-developed policy of reciprocity – steps by the US to respond to efforts by Vietnam to locate and return remains and provide issue-related archival documents. During subsequent stages of the normalization process, important leverage was lost without commensurate results; however, there has since been much greater responsiveness by Vietnam.

One way of examining Vietnam's ability to respond more fully is to look at what US intelligence and other data confirmed at the end of the war. At that time, 196 missing Americans were last known alive in captivity or reliably reported alive in close proximity to capture. Vietnam knows that these high priority cases are directly related to the live prisoner issue and has improved responsiveness but, thus far, has accounted for fewer than expected of these Americans by returning identifiable remains or archival evidence as to why such is not possible. In that regard, archival documentation is as yet incomplete. In all but very few of these cases, joint field operations have reportedly been sufficient to confirm death. Logically, if deceased, remains of these Americans should be recoverable; they were in captivity or on the ground in proximity to Vietnamese forces (other than those who died in captivity in South Vietnam). Recent unilateral efforts by Vietnam to conduct recoveries and provide working level archival research and records are encouraging and most welcome, as is the increased number of partnership agreements being reached.

On unilateral SRV provision of Archives, US wartime and post-war reporting on specific cases, captured SRV documents on the handling of US prisoners and casualities, and wartime debriefs of communist captives, reinforced by US-monitored directives and other reporting, form a clear picture of a comprehensive Vietnamese system for collection of information and remains, dating back to the French-Indochina War. Vietnam's leaders placed great value on recovery and/or recording of burial locations of US remains. In wartime, if jeopardized by imminent discovery or recovery by US forces, burial to hide remains was immediate; remains were later disinterred, photographed, when possible, reburied or, when feasible, transferred to Hanoi. Evidence of this complex process was confirmed by US intelligence.

Community-wide intelligence assessments served as the basis for long-standing US estimates that Vietnam could account for hundreds of Americans by unilaterally locating and returning remains. In 1986-87, the entire intelligence community concluded that Vietnam could unilaterally account for a significant number of US remains. The evidence was subsequently evaluated to establish the most realistic targets for Vietnam's government to meet. A thorough assessment was requested of DoD to weigh cooperation to date against earlier evidence-based expectations and determine realistic goals. Results were expected early in 2022 but, on September 15, 2022, the League was informed that a two-page assessment was published, but viewed by DPAA as "useless." Since that time, and despite several compelling requests sent to senior US officials, the DPAA Director has declined to request or conduct the intelligence assessment.

In his most recent refusal letter, DPAA Director Kelly McKeague stated, "an intelligence assessment may have been helpful in the past [but] it is anachronistic today given DoD's increasingly solid relationship with the VNOSMP, and as illustrated in assistance the government and people in Vietnam invariably provide to our accounting effort."¹ The VNOSMP, or Vietnam Office for Seeking Missing Persons, just celebrated its 50th anniversary at a highly visible ceremony in Hanoi, attended by the DPAA Director. Since US-SRV cooperation began in the mid-1980s, their interagency personnel comprising the VNOSMP have managed incoming funds and the level of SRV cooperation directed by the Politburo.

With the DPAA Director's third refusal, there was no longer any option for the League but to undertake the assessment necessary to determine realistic expectations, central to forming operational plans to accomplish and establish core objectives. League Executive Director Dr. Jay Veith is now focused on finalizing the needed assessment on SRV archives that have been and could yet be provided unilaterally if Hanoi decides it is in their interest. Due to pressing international policy and political concerns, now is a critical time to consider increasing bilateral and multilateral relations across the board. With Vietnam, that means moving from a comprehensive partnership to a comprehensive strategic one, a step the League has worked to support, so NOW IS THE TIME.

On unilateral SRV provision of remains, sources such as the mortician in 1979, substantiated in the 1980s by others, highlighted remains collection and storage as key aspects of Vietnam's policy leading to discussions with the US. After arduous and sustained negotilations, the US and Vietnam reached agreement to return remains of Americans that had been stored for years. Thus far, the number repatriated has not met evidence-based US expectations.

Forensic evidence serves as another basis for establishing expectations. Per the DPAA Lab, scientific evidence of above or below ground storage, or both, exists on fewer than 200 of the 730 identified remains returned from Vietnam since the end of the war. The count, confirmed by DPAA forensic scientists, is far below US expectations, based on reliable intelligence indicating that many more were recovered and stored by the Vietnamese government and could be repatriated, if authorized by Vietnam's leadership.

During a September 1982 ABC "Nightline" program, the late Vietnamese Deputy Prime Minister Nguyen Co Thach denied that Vietnam was holding any US remains. In 1983, Vietnam returned eight remains with clear evidence of storage. <u>Vietnam later admitted storage of remains</u>. In 1985, following up an initiative through a regional government, a US National Security Council (NSC) official met privately with an SRV Politburo member during an NSC-led US delegation to Hanoi in which the League participated. The carefully drawn plan was for negotiations on live prisoners and remains, but the minister indicated live prisoners were not on the table for discussion. Rather, as discussed with a third party, the subject was a large number of remains.

Negotiations in 1985 for a two-year plan brought the largest number of remains obtained to that point; nearly all showed evidence of long-term storage. Two specific cases were officially presented to officials in Hanoi in 1985-86, requesting unilateral assistance. Both losses were assessed by US officials as having occurred in Laos, in areas under Vietnamese control during the war. One was returned unilaterally in 1985, 98% complete and stored above ground since his 1972 incident along the border between Vietnam and Laos. From 1985 – 1989, 169 remains were repatriated, most showing clear evidence of long-term storage. In addition to locating remains in highly populated areas, Vietnam repatriated stored remains from Cambodia and remote locations.

In 1991 and 1993, the SRV provided grave registration lists with names of unaccounted-for Americans. Inclusion of these names appears to have been an intentional signal, as was filtering through private channels photographs of deceased Americans, some of whose remains have yet to be returned. SRV leaders directed combat photography; their soldiers did not own personal cameras, much less carry them. Regardless of mixed or conflicting assessments, these and other actions by SRV officials signaled the US of remains availability. At the time, remains fragments in Vietnam's possession were not repatriated, believed not to be identifiable, but US ability to identify very fragmentary remains has dramatically improved. If not yet fully repatriated, now is the time for all fragmentary, potential US remains to be returned.


In his March 20,2002, Certification to Congress, President George W. Bush formalized criteria for steps Vietnam should take unilaterally to be fully responsive on the accounting effort, further defined by Secretaries of State Powell and Rice three times. On March 7, 2008, the Bush Administration issued its Determination to Congress stating, ".....we urge Vietnam to work aggressively to improve tangibly its unilateral provision of POW/MIA-related documents and records, focused initially on archival data pertaining to Americans captured, missing or killed in areas of Laos and Cambodia under wartime Vietnamese control. Vietnam should also focus greater attention on locating and providing information on discrepancy cases with priority on those last known alive in captivity or in immediate proximity to capture, and to locating and repatriating the remains of those who died while in Vietnamese control that have not yet been returned..."

Vietnam's cooperation has continued to improve, including provision of some archival documents. There remain sensitive areas seldom accessible by US officials, but most are no longer off-limits. Importantly, SRV officials are now unilaterally conducting investigations, locating witnesses and making them available. With the DoD decision due to COVID restrictions, DPAA canceled all joint field operations for almost two years. In the interim, SRV officials authorized unilateral recoveries in various areas, a long-sought, welcome development with positive results. CDR Paul Charvet, USN, MIA in 1967, was unilaterally recovered Aug-Sep 2020 in the Hon Me area off the coast of northern Vietnam and identified on March 1, 2021. Unilateral recoveries in this area are a long-sought goal and adding private partnerships would likely help increase results that end the uncertainty of Vietnam War POW/MIA families. <u>December 12, 2022</u>, pledges by SRV Minister of Public Security To Lam to address increased unilateral steps are encouraging.

Information obtained from post-war US field operations reveals that central SRV authorities systematically directed the recovery of American remains. Eyewitnesses reported central-level supervision of remains recoveries of US personnel. Vietnam's leaders have repeatedly pledged to renew and increase their own efforts to locate and return remains and provide relevant documents, and have moved incrementally. Recently, SRV responsiveness has further increased. Further Increasing military-to-military cooperation and moving toward a comprehensive strategic partnership means now is the time for Vietnam to accelerate unilateral efforts to close these historic gaps. the







The PACT Act makes it easier for many survivors to receive Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC).

VA will be contacting survivors who were previously denied DIC benefits and may be newly eligible under the PACT Act. You do not need to wait for VA to contact you to submit a claim.

How to Apply for DIC and/or Accrued Benefits

Surviving family members may apply for these benefits using the appropriate VA form on va.gov/family-member-benefits.



Dependency and Indemnity Compensation

Monthly payment for the eligible surviving spouse, dependent children or parent(s) of the Veteran or service member IF Veteran or service member died in the line of duty or due to a service-related injury or illness.

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Accrued Benefits

A one-time payment to a surviving spouse, dependent child(ren) or dependent parent(s) of a deceased Veteran based on relationship when the record shows additional benefits (such as VA compensation or pension) due to the Veteran prior to passing.

Additional Survivor Benefits Available:



Burials and Burial Allowance

Burial benefits available include a gravesite in any of our National cemeteries with available space, opening and closing of the grave, perpetual care, a government headstone, marker, or medallion, a burial flag, and a Presidential Memorial Certificate, at no cost. Some survivors may also be eligible for a plot allowance, transportation allowance, and burial allowances based on the service connected disability status of the deceased Veteran.



Education and Training

Chapter 35 benefits and Fry Scholarship are the two main GI Bill programs offering educational assistance to survivors and dependents of Veterans who died in the line of duty or as a result of service-related disabilities.



Home Loan Guaranty

Final Monthly Payment

Certificate of Eligibility is available for surviving spouses receiving DIC.

If a Veteran who is receiving VA compensation or

pension benefits passes away, their last month of benefits can be paid to their surviving spouse.


Health Care

Are You eligible to file for benefits based on Presumptive Exposure?

Were you exposed to hazardous materials while serving in the military, such as from Agent Orange or burn pits? Did you serve in Vietnam, Thailand or Southwest Asia? If so, you may be eligible to file for service-connected benefits based on presumptive exposure.

Over the course of the last six months, VA has begun processing service-connected disability claims for six new presumptive conditions related to exposure to hazardous materials.

In May 2021, VA started implementing provisions of the William M. Thornberry National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2021 (NDAA), adding bladder cancer, hypothyroidism and Parkinsonism to the list of medical conditions presumptively associated with exposure to Agent Orange. A few months later, VA added asthma, rhinitis and sinusitis (to include rhinosinusitis) on a presumptive basis based on particulate matter exposures during military service in Southwest Asia and certain other areas.

Any Veteran who was previously denied service-connection for any of these six conditions but had symptoms manifest within 10 years of military service would need to file another claim. Be sure to use VA Form 20-0995, "Decision Review Request: Supplemental Claim" when filing. The claim form should include the name of the medical condition and also specify that the medical condition is being claimed due to in-service exposure to environmental hazards.

VA is committed to assisting Veterans who may have been exposed to hazardous materials during their military service.

Be sure to stay plugged in to www.va.gov for the most recent developments around environmental hazards; VA is constantly conducting research and surveillance, as well as reviewing scientific literature for conditions that may be related to exposure during military service.

If you feel you have a chronic condition attributed to an in-service exposure, we highly encourage you
